The Carolina Mundelein Trophy, the grand prize of the tournament, will again be the goal of 32 teams from every section of the United States. Last year De La Salle of Chicago in addition to the Mundelein Trophy won the Mayor of Chicago cup which is given annually to the Illinois team making the best showing in the tournament.

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
