Seton Hill President Dies; An Alumnus of St. Bernard's

Greensburg, Pa., March 27.—The Rev. Daniel Richard Sullivan, aged 56, President of Seton Hill College, died early on Wednesday morning in the Westmoreland Hospital, Greensburg, Pa., as a result of injuries to the spine, received in an automobile accident last November.

Dr. Sullivan was one of the leading Catholic educators of the East, and is widely known among students of economics and sociology. He came to Seton Hill in May, 1911, became dean of the faculty in 1918, and president in 1925.

He received his education at Susquehanna, Colgate Institute, Colgate University, and St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, N. Y., famous in his day under the late Bishop McQuaid of Rochester, and the Rev. Dr. Edward J. Hanna, now Archbishop

of San Francisco. He was ordained in 1909, for the Pittsburgh diocese, sent to Wilmington for a year, recalled to Pittsburgh by Archbishop Canavin, appointed assistant at Holy Cross Church, South Side, Pittsburgh in 1910, and chaplain at Seton Hill in 1911.

Dr. Sullivan was a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, a Fellow of the Royal Society of England, a member of the American Economic Association, of the Rural Life Association, of the American Sociological Association, of the National Catholic Education Association, of the American Association of University Professors, and of the American Association for Labor Legislation.

Students Turned Easter Time to Good Account

As soon as there was a university, clerks and students were running the streets of Paris at Easter time, "seeking their eggs" as gifts from substantial householders, and "slighting launds" — in well-known modern style.

Some time in the year 1100 was revived the forgotten art of scratching decorations on red eggs or of pasting on designs to keep them free from color underneath — initials, dates, fishes, circles, crosses, lambs and good shepherds.

In the place of the kings of France, where Easter was a grandiose fête, every mother's son, to the least page and kitchen boy, had eggs to tick and compliments to exchange.

Odd English Customs

A quaint custom, indigenous to Lancashire, England, was that of placing bits of colored rag on the dresses of women on their way to church. While the origin and meaning of this practice is doubtful, one commentator suggests that it probably originally referred to the palm branch procession preceding the crucifixion of Jesus, when the children thronged his path and their elders threw clothes in the way as he rode into Jerusalem.

Actual Resurrection Date

The Betrayal of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, occurred on the evening following Thursday, 14th Nisan, April 6, A. D., 30, at 10 or 11 p. m. or according to others, soon after midnight. The crucifixion was about 9 a. m. on Friday, 15th Nisan, April 7, A. D., 30. The Resurrection was "as the day began to dawn" on Sunday, 17th Nisan, April 9, A. D., 30. The Ascension took place on Thursday, May 18, A. D., 30, of A. U. C., that is year of Rome 753.
