Knute Rockne Mourned By the Entire Nation After Death in Plane

do nice things for them. Thousands of boys and adults, for that matter, wept throughout America when they heard of his death. He was a friend to them—though many of them never saw him—and they were overcome by the tragedy of his death.

Why a Convert?

There was little surprise in Catholic circles when Knute Rockne became a convert to the Catholic Church in 1926. He told a Holy Name Society why he did—the chief instance was the sincere, devout and simple faith of his boys—boys who never missed Mass; boys who seldom or ever used profanity; boys who lived clean, noble lives, and prayed with fervent faith for victory; boys who, braced and baited, won a Sunday morning, after terrific Saturday games, always arose early and quietly slipped out to Mass.

"I felt out of place sleeping lightly in bed while my boys were making such sacrifices," he said. "I couldn't live and work with them and not be influenced by their remarkable faith in God." he said. "And now," he added, with a touch of triumph, "for the first time in my life I can honestly say I am one of them without a single reservation."

His Four Children

Rockne was married in 1914 to Miss Bonnie Shiles of Sandusky, O. They have four children, the youngest five, the oldest 15. His wife and the two youngest children were in Miami, Fla., when he was killed. They left at once for Notre Dame.

Rockne was born in Voss, Norway, and was brought to America by his parents when five years old. He lived in Chicago. His people were poor, and he worked his way through college. He was a great believer in work, in neatness, in energy, and in doing everything with enthusiasm.

His Body Brought Home

His body was brought to Notre Dame Wednesday night. With it were his sons, "Billy," aged 15, and Knute, Jr., aged 11, who left a school in Kansas City for the sad home-coming journey with their father. Thousands of people met the body at the train. It was taken to a funeral home, and early next week the funeral will be held in the Sacred Heart Church at Notre Dame. He will be buried here, at rest at last with his own.

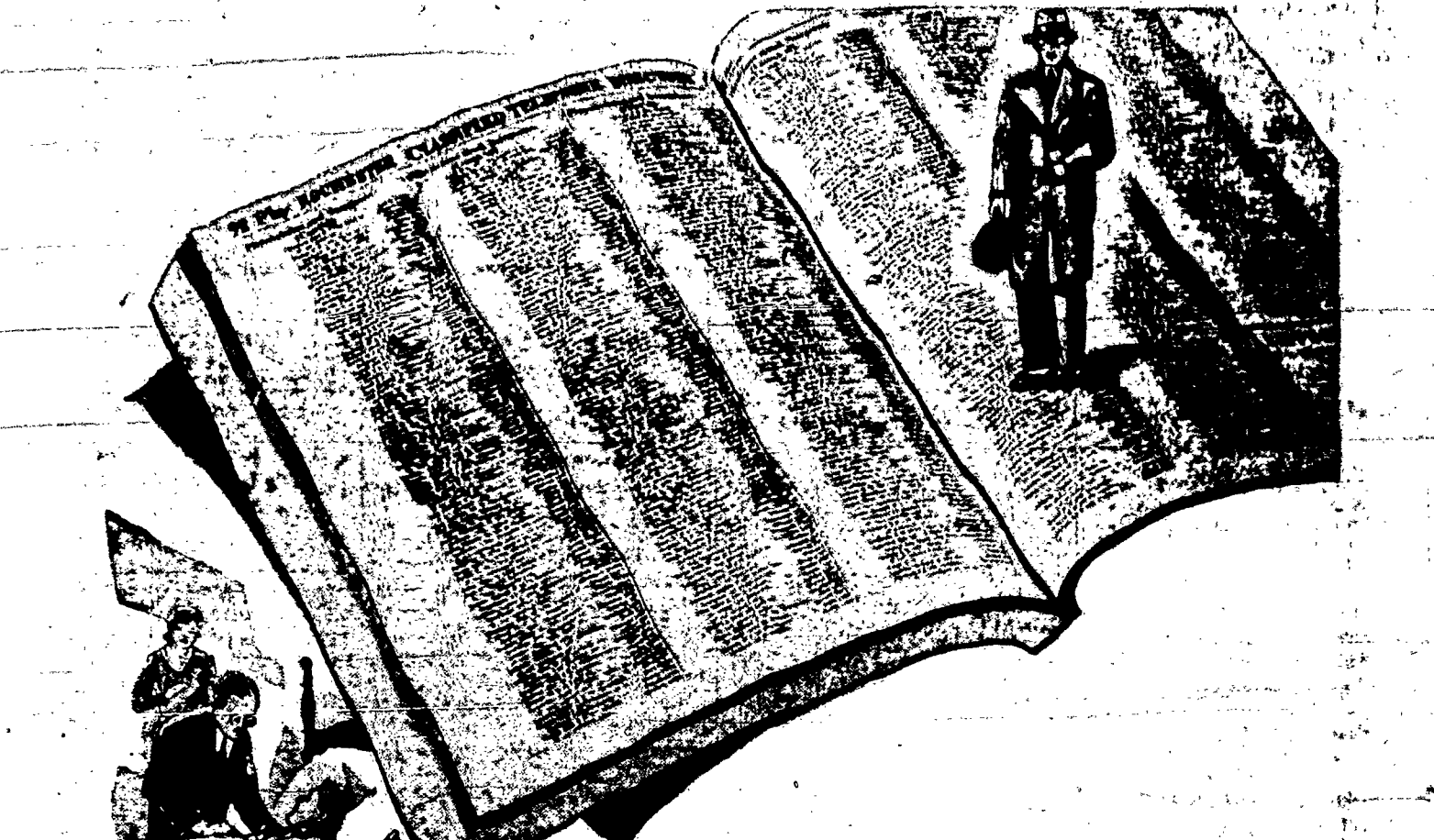
