Millions Left to Charity By Col. Michael Friedsam, Noted N. Y. Business Man

New York Catholic Charities Will Receive \$20,000—Three
Executors Have Power to Divide Vast Estate
Among Various Charities.

New York, April 17.—The will of Col. Michael Friedsam, president of B. Altman & Co., of this city, probated here Monday, left \$20,000 to the Catholic Charities of New York, \$20,000 to each of five other charities, a \$10,000,000 art collection, to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, and an estate of many millions of dollars to be divided among various educational and charitable institutions who are given full power in the selection of the institutions.

The six charities named in the will, which provides that \$170,000 shall be divided equally among them, are the New York Foundling Hospital, the Hebrew Orphan Asylum of the City of New York, the Hospital for Chronic Diseases, the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, the Salvation Army and the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York.

Millions to Charity
Colonel Friedsam left the entire residue of his estate to education and charity. Colonel Friedsam left to his three executors the determination of what institutions are to benefit. The value of the residue, after payment of the specific bequests, totaling more than \$800,000, is not known, beyond a statement that it consists of "many millions."

"The residue, the will provides, is to be administered 'for the care of the young and the comfort of the old,' and for institutions of learning."

John Stephen Burke, vice president of the B. Altman Co., is one of the executors of the will. Edwin J. Steiner, brother-in-law of Colonel Friedsam, and Clarence W. Wood are the other executors. Mr. Burke receives \$50,000 from the estate, 5,000 shares of B. Altman stock, and \$10,000 is left to each of the three children of Mr. Burke.

ent entrance and use the entrance to the new building for both buildings. The administration offices of the hospital will be located on the first floor of the new building. There will also be 16 private rooms on this floor.

The second floor will provide 21 private rooms and five semi-private ward of two beds and a large general ward of eight beds for women. The third floor will have 21 private rooms, one semi-private ward and an eight-bed ward for men.

On the fourth floor 21 private rooms and five semi-private rooms are planned. Seventeen private rooms and five semi-private wards will be located on the fifth floor.

Ten private rooms for persons who are not acutely ill but who require rest or special treatment will be located on the sixth floor. Three isolation rooms and a large sun room are also planned for this floor.

Every private room in the proposed building will be directly connected with a lavatory or bath. On each floor there will be the usual kitchen, chart room and lavatories for general use. Two elevators will be installed in the new building.

The capacity of the present medical building is 40 beds. The new medical building will provide a total of 148 beds, 108 in private rooms, 40 in semi-private wards and 16 in the general wards.

Sub-Contracts Not Let
The sub-contracts have not been let yet for the new building, but will be within the next few weeks.

The old medical building, the original St. Joseph's Hospital building, was erected about 60 years ago for educational purposes and was known for some time as the Academy

the responsible 'consular officer' at Victoria."

A Change of Front
The State Department announced on Tuesday that the visa was granted on Saturday, after Miss Young presented satisfactory documentary and other evidence to establish her admissibility to the United States under the immigration laws. The announcement said:

"In view of the unusual interest which has been taken by the press in the case of Miss Young, the Irish poetess, the Department of State has received from the American Consul at Victoria, B. C., Canada, stating that on Friday, April 10th, Miss Young presented satisfactory documentary and other evidence to establish her admissibility to the United States under the immigration laws and accordingly was granted an immigration visa on Saturday, April 11, 1931."

Mrs. Young Was Misunderstood
"It may be added that there appears to have been some misconception on the part of interested persons of the reasons for the delay which Miss Young experienced in receiving her visa. According to information received by the department, although the Consul at Victoria—who in view of Miss Young's application for a visa was the only officer of the government competent under the immigration laws to pass on her visa application—received from persons interested in her case considerable correspondence in relation to her application for a visa, Miss Young's ability, character, etc., until it was no longer possible to delay her visa was presented to him by Miss Young herself on which he could properly make a favorable legal decision in her case."

"Immediately upon the presentation of such evidence and the finding by the Consul of its sufficiency under the law, a visa was issued to her."

The exact nature of this evidence has not been reported to the department by Mr. Dugelin, who had complete authority to deal with the case. He is expected to make his residence in California and devote his time to literature. A movement has also been started to endow a chair for her in some Western university.

Priest, Alumnus Of St. Bernard's, Dies in Buffalo

Buffalo, April 17.—The Rev. Joseph Nagorski, aged 57, residing in Buffalo, died recently in this city, and was buried in St. Stanislaus Cemetery here last week.

Father Nagorski was formerly a newspaperman in Detroit and other cities. He was born in Erie, Pa., received his classical education at the Polish Seminary at Orchard Lake, Mich., completed his philosophy at St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, and was ordained to the priesthood, June 11, 1927.
