BISHOP McQUAID FOUNDED COLLEGE FOR EDUCATION OF YOUNG MEN IN 1856

South Orange, N. J., April 24.-Seton Hall College, founded in 1856, by the late Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, D.D., first Bishop of Rochester, when he was a young priest in .charge of several missions in New Jersey, will celebrate its Diamond Jubilee here on June 4th. Thousands of alumni from all parts of the United-States, Canada, Mexico and the Philippines will be present at the Jubilee exercises, and special religious services will be held in honor of Bishop McQuaid and other pioneer educators of the college.



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Cardinal Will Celebrate Mass For The Favorable Consideration Of Canonization of Mother Seton

And Bronze Tablet in Memory of Foundress of Sisters of Charity in America Will Be Unveiled on May Eighth in New York City.

New York, April 24.—Sisters f Charity from all parts of the United States and Canada, with alumnae from convent schools and colleges throughout the country, will assemble at St. Peter'sChurch, in Barclay Street here on the morning of May 9 to attend a Mass celebrated by Cardinal Hayes for the favorable consideration of the canonization of Mother Elizabeth Seton, founder of the Sisters of Charity in this country, as America's first native-born saint.

Sisters of Charity and members of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae. led by the president, Mrs. Philip A. Brennan, of 309. Garfield Place, Brooklyn, will receive communion and afterwards attend the univeiling and blessing of a bronze tablet erected on the wall of the church in memory of Mother Se-The ceremonies will be followed by a communion breakfast at the Me-Alpin Hotel, Broadway, and 34th Street.

The Mases and dedication of the tablet will mark the first official act of Cardinal Hayes in recognition of the movement for the canonization of Mother Seton, who was born in this city near Bowling Green, the daughter of Dr. Richard Bayley, professor of anatomy at King's College, now Columbia University. The ceremonies will also give official aanetion to the pligrimage now being organized by the Federation of Catholic Aluminae, the National Council of Catholic Women, and the Catholic Daughters of America, to carry a petition bearing 100,000 names to Rome in July for presentation to Pope Pius XI.




