## Parish League Schedule Opens Next Week With Games Tues., Wed., Fri'y

**Twenty-Five School Teams Will Swing Into Action on City, School and Private Diamonds — Volunteer Umpires Are Badly Needed — Bishop O'Hern to Throw the First Ball**

The Rochester Parish School Baseball League, with 25 teams "rarin' to go," will swing into action next week in all parts of the city. The opening games will be played on Tuesday, others on Wednesday and others on Friday, all games beginning about 4 o'clock, and to last seven innings. Bishop O'Hern will throw the first ball, in the game between the Cathedral and St. Peter & Paul's teams, on the Armory diamond. Three new teams entered the League since last week, making 25 in all—St. Joseph's Orphan Asylum, Corpus Christi and Holy Redeemer. It is expected that all of the games will be hotly contested, filled with thrills and excitement, and well worth seeing.

## Jesse Harper Athletic Boss At Notre Dame

**Kansas Ranchman Accepts Position He Held for Four Years—Will Continue the Policies Now in Force**

Notre Dame, April 24. — Jesse Harper, Kansas ranchman, and director of athletics at Notre Dame University from 1912 to 1917, has accepted his old position and will return here as athletic director, succeeding Knute Rockne, who succeeded him. Harper accepted the position upon the urgent request of the Rev. Charles L. O'Donnell, C.S.C., president of Notre Dame. He says he will continue the athletic policies now in force here.  
 Harper, formerly a University of Chicago star, made a good record with his football teams at Notre Dame. His teams won 32 games, lost 6 and tied 1, and his other teams made strong showings. Rockne played under him in 1912 and 1913 and became his assistant in 1914. When Harper left Notre Dame, Rockne became director of athletics upon Harper's recommendation.  
 Harper expressed himself as "very much pleased after being away so long to be asked to come back again." His Kansas ranch is "efficiently managed" and will not suffer from his absence, Harper said.

## Eleven Watches, All Engraved, For Mack Stars

Philadelphia, April 24.—Specially made watches bearing engraved likenesses of the recipients on the backs of the gold cases are to be presented to eleven members of the World Champion Athletics by the National Commission, composed of the heads of the American and National Leagues and Commissioner K. M. Landis.  
 Last year the Athletics players received diamond rings. They requested to make known their wishes for this year, following their triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1930 world series, some of the A's who had not received diamond rings requested them as gifts; others asked for larger stones on the rings already in their possession, while eleven players asked for the watches.

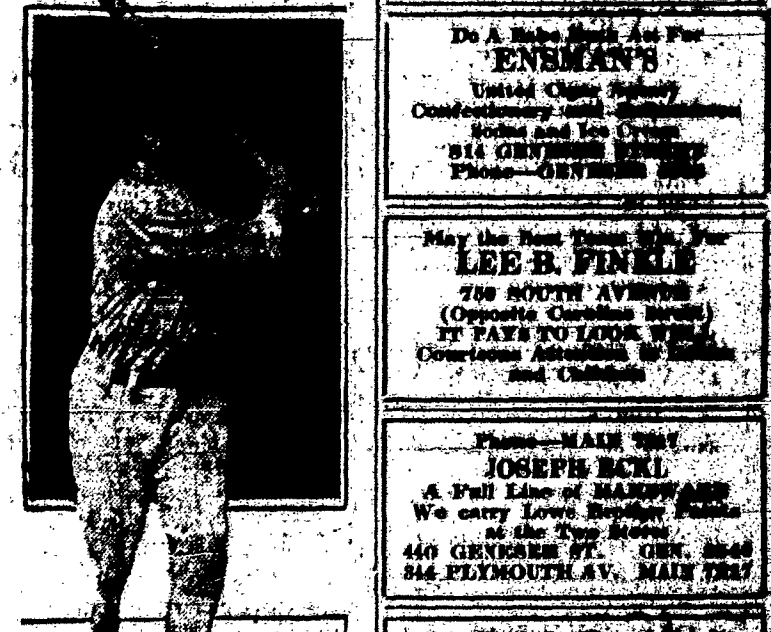
