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Hornell Church Has New Pastor, Rev. J. F. Farrell

Former Assistant at St. Ann's Church for Five Years, Returns as Rector—Was at Lima for Nineteen Years.

Hornell, April 24.—The Rev. John F. Farrell, M.R., pastor of St. Rose's Church, Lima, for the past 19 years, has been appointed irremovable rector of St. Ann's Church, Hornell, by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester. The appointment will become effective at 12 o'clock noon, on Saturday, May 2d. In going back to Hornell, Father Farrell will return to his first priestly home, for he served for five years as assistant rector of St. Ann's after his ordination in 1897. The appointment was made following a Concursus examination held at the Chancery Office to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Rev. Francis J. Naughton.

Sketch of His Life
Father Farrell is one of the best known and best loved priests of our diocese, having been ordained almost 35 years ago, and having served as Chaplain and pastor for 29 years. Father Farrell was born on February 7, 1869, at Clyde, N. Y., son of John Farrell and Mary Moran. He graduated from St. Andrew's Seminary in Clyde in 1891, and was ordained from St. Bernard's Theological Seminary on June 12, 1897. After ordination his first appointment was as assistant pastor at St. Ann's, Hornell, July 1, 1897, where he remained until his appointment as administrator of the parish on the death of Father Morrison, until the appointment of the new pastor, Rev. Francis J. Naughton in July, 1902. Father Naughton was appointed Chaplain at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Civil Hospital, N. Y., where he remained until December 1, 1912, when he was made pastor of St. Rose's Church for 19 years. He is a scholarly and genial priest, beloved by every one for his splendid qualities of priestliness and Christian charity, and also for his interest in all things pertaining to civic duty and the welfare. He is well known to Hornell by account of his several years of service there, and will be welcomed back by the people of St. Ann's with open hearts.

Bishop O'Hern called the meeting to order after the luncheon, and made an excellent plea for solidarity, unity and action in the new organization. He was followed by the organizer of the Council, Dr. Anne Nicholson, who emphasized the need of team work and of unswerving loyalty.
Very Rev. Walter J. Lee, LL.D., rector of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva, was the speaker at the luncheon. He gave a splendid address, beautifully worded, inspiring and helpful.

"This organization," he said, "will have a wholesome influence upon the religious, social and home life of every woman connected with it. You must have something to map out a plan of action, something to connect your energies, something to direct your enthusiasm. The National Council of Catholic Women will do that for you, and will provide enlightened progressive action for every Catholic woman."
This Council will broaden your horizon. There is too much of what we call the parochial area of the world today, too much that is narrow, and almost intolerant. We must adventure into those things that are profitable and wholesome, that will broaden our vision and help our spirit of charity. This organization will do that.

Be Kind to Others
"Another spirit we should seek to eradicate from our lives is the inclination to show a hostile or bitter spirit to those not of our Faith. Let us show a kindly, neighborly helpful spirit to all people, and give them an understanding of the consolation and inspiration brought to our homes and our children by our Faith."

Father Lee told how a non-Catholic woman, head of the Home Economics Department of Cornell University, had read in an address of Catholic women some time ago, exclaimed, with tears in her eyes: "Every woman here represents a home that has not been broken, and that will not be broken."
"Remember," Father Lee said, "that women were the first to leave Calvary, and the first to greet our risen Saviour. You have a great opportunity here to do good work for your diocese, for your organization and for yourselves, if you remain loyal to the fine spirit of Christian Faith that has always actuated our women. Give the noblest efforts of your heart, your mind and your souls to this Council, and those who come after you will rise up and call you blessed."
