The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, has announced a Diocesan-wide Novena for the promotion of Religious vocations, to be held in all Churches of the Diocese, beginning Friday, May 1st, and ending Sunday, May 10th. Sermons, instructions, and public and private prayers will be held in all churches, and there will be special exercises in all parish schools. ### Cathedral of Soissons. Destroyed During the War,

Historic Edifice, Where Joan of Arc Prayed, Reduced to Shapeless Mass of Ruins by Rain of Shells, Is Being Reconstructed

Paris, May 1.—The shell-torn Cathedral at Solssons, city of tragic war memories from which the Germans were driven in 1918, was restored officially to the parishioners Sunday, in a ceremony that attracted many thousands of grateful and devoted people. The Cathedral, destroyed by a rain of high-power German shells during the World War, has been under reconstruction for the past 11 years. The west portals and towers and the nave, as far as the transepts, have been faithfully restored by the French Government to resume the same aspect as when St. Louis kept his watch at the altar there on assuming his knighthood and when Joan of Arc went there to pray.
