Rev. P. A. Neville Is Made Pastor Of Lima Church

Well-Known Pastor of East Bloomfield Church Succeeds the Rev. John Farrell, Who Recently Went to Hornell.

Bishop O'Hern announces the appointment of Rev. Patrick A. Neville of East Bloomfield as pastor of St. Rose's Church, Lima, N. Y., to succeed the Rev. John Farrell, who has been promoted to the pastorate of St. Ann's Church, Hornell, N. Y. The appointment followed an official concursus examination held at the Chancery Office this week, as St. Rose's Parish carries with it the title of "M.R.," which means irremovable rector. Father Neville's appointment will become effective Saturday, May 16, at 12 o'clock.

Rev. Patrick Aloysius Neville was born at Victor, Ontario, Canada, in 1864, the son of John Neville and Mary Cunningham. He attended St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary in Rochester, and from there went to St. Joseph's Theological Seminary, Troy, N. Y. When St. Bernard's Seminary was opened in the late Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid, Father Neville completed his education for the priesthood in that diocesan institution, from which he was ordained at St. Patrick's Cathedral on June 8, 1895, thus being in the 36th year of his priesthood.

After his ordination Father Neville was appointed assistant pastor at Holy Family Parish, Auburn, N. Y., June 19, 1895, and from there was made rector of St. Bridget's Church at East Bloomfield, to which parish was attached later St. Joseph's Church at East Bloomfield. Father Neville has now been the parish priest to the people of the Bloomfield for more than 30 years, and during his time there improved the Church properties very much and leaves the parishes free from indebtedness.

K. of C. To Open A Summer Course At Cliff Haven

New Haven, May 8.—The Supreme Council Boy Life Bureau of the Knights of Columbus will again conduct a ten-day training school in Boy Leadership with the co-operation of the Catholic Summer School of America, Cliff Haven, New York, opening August 4 and running through the 13th. This school offers a real opportunity to K. of C. councils, individual members of the Order and Catholic men interested in and desirous of bettering their leisure-time guidance of youth, to receive an intensive and practical training in the philosophy and techniques of all approved major organizations.

North Dakota U. Makes A Canvas Of Its Religion

Bismark, N. D., May 8.—Religious preference designated by the greatest number of students at the University of North Dakota is Lutheran, according to R. O. Wilson, registrar. Nineteen church faiths are listed in a report on church affiliations. The Lutherans were the most numerous, with 445 students preferring that faith, and the Presbyterians, next in number, were 259. Church with students over 100 giving respective preference, are: Methodist, 221; Catholic, 215, and Congregational, 125.

It was found here the other day in an obscure corner of the museum of Drexel Institute. Covered with gilt shamrocks, the harp was an emblem to museum attendants until it was learned that George W. Cardinal Says Divorce Evils Not Comforting

This is a Day When Very Many People Are Turning Away From Their Altars And From Practical Religion, He Says.

Cardinal Says Divorce Evils Not Comforting

New York, May 8.—His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes was the principal speaker at the 10th annual Communion Breakfast of the New York Postoffice Holy Name Society, held here recently at the Hotel Astor. More than 4,000 members were present, and Cardinal Hayes took occasion to lament the evils of divorce and the growing indifference to religion in the land. It was his first public utterance since his return from the South.

The breakfast followed Mass and the recitation of Holy Communion at St. Patrick's Cathedral, where nearly 4,000 members of the society renewed their spiritual pledge and heard Mass celebrated by Cardinal Hayes.

"This is a day when very many people are turning away from their altars and wandering from the practical side of their religion as expressed in their attendance in their church," the Cardinal said at the breakfast.

Attacks Birth Control

The Rev. Robert I. Gannon, dean of St. Peter's College, Jersey City, attacked birth control movement, and said he did not believe the recent action of the Federal Council of Churches in favor of it was representative of the main body of Protestant opinion.

Supreme Court Justice William F. Buckley of Yorkers said New York courts were interpreting the law in such a way as to permit the dissolution of marriage through easy annulment.

Other speakers included the Rev. Thomas F. Conlon, national director of the Holy Name Society; Michael Williams, editor of The Commonwealth, and Donald Brian, actor. The Rev. John J. Kiernan, spiritual director of the Postoffice Holy Name Society, was toastmaster.
