Hanna, D.D., Archbishop of San Francisco, was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. The Archbishop delivered the invocation and benediction at the exercises.
An unusually large class was graduated from the University, and Archbishop Hanna was heartily applauded when he received his degree.

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Ground Is Broken at Asylum For New Recreational Building That Will Have Large Gymnasium
The Gift of a Deceased Donor, the Building Will Be Known as the Robert Jennings Memorial—Will Be Completed Early in July

Ground was broken on Thursday afternoon last week by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, for a large new recreational building at St. Patrick's Orphan Asylum. The building will be of stucco, two stories high, 50 by 78 feet, and it will contain a modern gymnasium on the first floor. It is planned to have the building completed early in July. Frank M. Quinlan is the architect.
The new Girl Scout troop at the Asylum opened its headquarters in the site of the new structure. Among those in attendance, besides the Sisters of St. Joseph, and the girls who are residents of the asylum, were Mrs. William E. Werner, Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, Rev. Walter A. Feery, director of the Rochester Catholic Charities; Rev. Charles E. Reynolds, vice-chancellor of the Diocese; Rev. John Newcomb, chaplain of the asylum; and William E. Maloney and Raymond J. Curran, of the building committee.
For Happy Recreation
The new building, it is expected, will be an ideal recreational building. Besides the gymnasium on the ground floor, there will be a playroom and dressing rooms. The gym will also be used as an auditorium. The second floor will contain a playroom, library, reading room, and supervisor's room. A passageway will connect the new addition with the main building. There will be special provision for segregating groups desiring quiet play from those desiring more noisy activities.
Bishop O'Hern spoke of the history of the Asylum. He said it was founded in 1841, and that during the first 25 years of its existence it was in charge of the Sisters of Charity. He described the growth and expansion of the institution under the two previous Bishops of Rochester, Diocese, and emphasized the importance of physical fitness in the educational field.
Bishop O'Hern told of the benefits derived by the Asylum from the Community Chest, and he praised the Industrial Group for their generous contribution towards the Chest. The only discouraging note in the campaign thus far, he said, was that caused by men and women well able to contribute more generously than they did. The Bishop was heard with appreciation by his audience, and he was given a rousing reception by the girls of the Asylum. The new building will be a great blessing to all of them, and they are very happy that construction has been started upon it.

Thousands See Motherhouse of Mercy Sisters
Fine New Building is Dedicated by Bishop O'Hern—Dedictory Sermon Was Preached by Archbishop Hickey.

The fine new Motherhouse of the Sisters of Mercy, on Blossom Road, was dedicated last Sunday by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester. The Bishop celebrated Mass on a temporary altar on the east lawn, and the sermon was preached by Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., Archbishop of Vincennes. Students of St. Andrew's Seminary assisted in the service, and the Sisters' choir sang the Mass. Many friends of the Sisters of Mercy were in attendance.
Assisting Bishop O'Hern were pastors of parishes in the Diocese in the Sisters of Mercy teach. These officers were: Assistant pastor, Rev. James B. Keenan; deacons of honor, Rev. Alexander J. McCabe and Rev. George W. Eeki; deacon of the Mass, Rev. John B. Sullivan; subdeacon, Rev. Walter J. Curran; master of ceremonies, Rt. Rev. Msgr. Andrew B. Mehan.
Archbishop Hickey preached an appropriate and eloquent sermon. Such orders as the Sisters of Mercy, he said, are trying to live up to the two great commandments of God—to love God with their whole hearts and souls, and to love their neighbors as themselves for the love of God.
"These women," he continued, "are devoting themselves in religion to the Lord's work of education. There can be no education that eliminates God. The destiny of the soul is God. Therefore, the very soul of education should be the spiritual development of children under the guidance of those who have dedicated themselves to Him."
Archbishop Hickey commended the work of the Sisters of Mercy, complimented them on the completion of their new Motherhouse, and asked God's blessing upon them, their activities and their school. He was heard with appreciation by all of the people.
Dinner was served to the Bishop, Archbishop and clergy after the dedicatory services, and Bishop O'Hern spoke happily and appreciatively of the work of the Sisters of Mercy. He reviewed the work of the order since it was founded in Ireland in 1873, and told of the remarkable accomplishments of the Order in America.
