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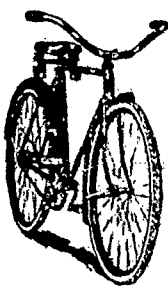

Holy Redeemer Bowler Wins Of \$200 Prize

Herbert J. Scheuch won second prize—the goodly sum of \$200—in the Journal-American Bowling Classic for the championship of the city last Friday evening, after one of the most exciting contests ever held in Rochester.

"Billy" Arndt won first prize, \$500, and a solid and diamond studded, symbolic of the championship. He had a lead of 102 pins over Scheuch.

Scheuch is a member of the bowling team of Holy Redeemer Church, and was high man in the Catholic Bowling League in the past season, with a remarkable average of 203.5 in 84 games. He was high man, also, in three games for the season, 751, in the Catholic League, and was tower of strength in helping the Holy Redeemer team win the championship of that league, and the silver trophy cup for the season.

The contest for the city championship was a hair-raising one. Scheuch was ahead 149 pins when he and Arndt went into the final ten-game block. Arndt gained a 191 pin on him in the first five games, and Scheuch's unerring skill seemed to fall him in the next four games. In the sixth game he fell to 158 pins, while Arndt made 214, giving him a lead of eight and he added to score a 315 lead in the seventh, rolling 240 to 201, 10 in the eighth, rolling 204 to 125, 33 in the ninth, rolling 222 to 113, making a total of 102.

In the final game the score was 193. Both bowlers won great applause, and Scheuch showed that he is worthy of being ranked among the first and best of the city. His friends all over the city are congratulating him, and two or three prizes of life and health of the city will be remembered for a long time by those who were fortunate enough to be spectators.
