

Rey. D. J. Dooling Will Celebrate Silver Jubilee

Pastor of Mother Church Western New York Twenty-Five Years a Priest—Rev. William P. Ryan to Preach.

Next Tuesday, June 9th, the Rev. D. J. Dooling, pastor of St. John's Church, Utica, N. Y., will celebrate the silver jubilee of his ordination to the priesthood. The jubilee Mass will be at 11 o'clock, new time, and the sermon of the day will be preached by the Rev. William P. Ryan, of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester. The deacon of the Mass will be the Rev. Richard P. O'Connor, pastor of St. Paul's Church, Whitesboro, N. Y.; sub-deacon, Rev. William A. Moore, pastor of St. Mary's Church, Clinton, N. Y., and the sub-deacon, Rev. Aubrey R. Seiler, assistant pastor of St. John's Church. A dinner will be served in the rectory at 6 or more o'clock.

All of the above priests are well known in Rochester and vicinity. Father O'Connor and Father Seiler are of St. Bernard's Seminary, and frequently visit here. Father Dooling is a native of Syracuse. He studied at the college and seminary at Nazareth, and was ordained there on June 2, 1876. He served in Fulton, Syracuse and Utica before going to St. John's, where he has been pastor for the past six years, succeeding the Rt. Rev. Msgr. J. S. M. Lynch. St. John's Church is the mother church for all of Central and Southern New York. It is the first Catholic church founded west of the Allegheny River, and in the old days many couples west from Rochester and neighboring places to be married in St. John's. The church is a venerable one, and has a history of nearly a century, and it has a historical record that is second to none in the State.

Father Dooling will have the congratulations and good wishes of many friends in the Diocese of Rochester on his jubilee, and they will wish him many happy years of fruitful and blessed ministry.

Liturgy School To Be Conducted June to August

By Benedictine Fathers at Collegeville, Minn. — Series of Lectures on the Mass and Other Features

Collegeville, Minn., June 5.—The Benedictine Fathers of St. John's Abbey have just announced that from June 26 to August 5 they will conduct the third summer session of the Liturgical Summer School, under the auspices of the Liturgical Apostolate of the Abbey. They have been prompted to this by the general satisfaction expressed over the past two summer sessions, especially on the part of the Sisters attending the courses. The courses are substantially the same as in the past, except that a few have been added and others have been extended.

Variety of Subjects
There will be a series of lectures on the sacramental life of the Church, Catholic Action, etc. There will be three courses in Gregorian Chant, Church Latin for beginners, voice training, organ lessons for beginners, and a variety of other subjects.

Shortly after the opening of the courses, the students will participate in the daily morning sacrifice by means of the Missa recitata, or dialog Mass. For official evening prayers, Compigne will be sung each evening in the Abbey church. Informal seminary gatherings will be held, on occasion offers, for the purpose of working out practical projects on the use of the Church's liturgy in the religious instruction of children. The daily liturgy lessons, at which attendance is free for all the students, will further help to explain the fundamental ideas behind the religious "restoration of all things in Christ," so marked everywhere in the Catholic Church today, and called The Liturgical Movement.

Plans are being made for having a Liturgical Day in the nearby episcopal city of St. Cloud, Minnesota, under the auspices of the Rt. Rev. Joseph P. Busch, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese. Patrick Coakley Died Suddenly Of Heart Attack
Patrick Coakley, for 43 years an employe of the Union Clothing Co., died suddenly this week at the Highland Hospital of a heart attack. His funeral was held on Thursday morning in Corpus Christi Church, and it was attended by a large number of relatives and friends.

Mr. Coakley was widely known in the city, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He was a native of Quebec, but had lived in Rochester for more than half a century. He was a kindly, courteous and capable man, and his memory will be treasured by all who knew him well. He is survived by his wife, Mary Callahan Coakley; a daughter, Mrs. George Christ; two sons, William H. and Leo L.; a brother, William, of Fayetteville; two sisters, Mrs. John Christy of Anacondo, Mont., and Mrs. John Walkup of Repton, Wash., and a grandson.

Tells Court That Word "Catholic" Applies Exclusively to the Faith Of Those Attached to See of Rome

Newark, N. J., June 5.—Called as an expert witness in a suit brought by members of the St. Stanislaus Society of Passaic, N. J., to prevent the admission of non-Roman Catholics to the society, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas H. McLaughlin, president of Seton Hall College, testified Friday that the word "Catholic" applies exclusively to the faith of those in communion with the see of Rome. Msgr. McLaughlin declared that while the word was used loosely in reference to certain religious groups

not affiliated with Rome, that it was not the accepted use. Ms. McLaughlin said he disagreed with the definitions of the word "catholic" given in the Encyclopedia Britannica, the Standard Dictionary, Webster's International, and others. He said the term "Roman Catholic" never was the proper appellation for the Church, and the word "man" is recognized by the Church only in the "declarative," sense stating the fact that Rome is Holy See.

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
