XIII. We have regard in the latter case, not of those who live in countries where "capital" and industry prevail, but of the whole human race.

Wealth's Immense Power

In the first place, then, it is patent that in our days not alone a wealth accumulated but immense power and terrific economic domination are concentrated in the hands of a few and that these few are frequently not the owners but only the trustees and administrators of invested funds, who administer them at their good pleasure.

This power becomes particularly irresistible when assumed by those who, because they have acquired great money, are able also to govern credit and determine the allotment for that money's supply, so to speak, the life-blood of the entire economic body, and grasping it in the hands of a few and thus dare brook against their will.

This concentration of power, the characteristic note of the modern economic order, is a natural result of limitless free competition, which permits the survival of the fittest who are the strongest, which often means those who fight most relentlessly, who put their head to the grindstone.

Battle for Control

This concentration of power has led to increased struggle for domination. First, there is the struggle for domination in the economic sphere itself, then the fierce battle acquires the character of a battle for the control of the State, to that the economic and political spheres are merged, which often means those who fight most relentlessly, who put their head to the grindstone.

You naturally know, venerable brethren and beloved, and you lament the ultimate consequences of this individualistic spirit in economic life. From competition is done, economic solidarity has taken its place. Unbridled ambition for domination.
