Lutheran Teacher Denounces The Rise of 'Pulpit Infidels' Who Preach Gospel of Free Love

Says Such Preachers Betray Their Lord Worse Than Judas—Says Loose Marriage Relations Bring Moral Bankruptcy to the Land.

Lutheran, Pa., June 25.—A severe indictment of "pulpit infidels," preachers and champions of the gospel of "free love," was made here Sunday at the international convention of the young people of the Lutheran Church by Professor Walter A. Maier of Concordia Theological Lutheran Seminary, St. Louis, Mo. More than 2,000 delegates were in attendance, and they were enthusiastic over the talk by Prof. Maier. He spoke in part as follows:

John P. Miles, Dies in Buffalo

Lyons, June 25.—Taken seriously ill while visiting in Buffalo, John P. Miles, aged 43 years, a well known railroad man of the village, died suddenly in a Buffalo hospital on Monday. His body was brought here, and his funeral held in St. Michael's church at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning. The services were attended by many friends, including a number of railroad employes. Mr. Miles, born in Lyons, entered the employ of the N. Y. C. Railroad when he was 14 years of age, and had served continuously since that time. For several years he had been a conductor in the Lyons and Newark yards. At one time he was yard master in Canandaigua and after holding that position for a few years he was returned to the Lyons yards, where he had since remained. Mr. Miles' grandfather, Patrick Miles, helped build the New York Central Railroad through this village and at one time his father, John Miles, was yardmaster here. A brother and an uncle also were in the service of the railroad company for a number of years. Mr. Miles was chairman of the Lyons Unit of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and as a delegate had attended the convention in Houston, Tex. He was on his return trip home when his death occurred. He leaves one daughter, Miss Marjorie Miles of Lyons; one son, John William Miles of Buffalo, N. Y.; his father, John Miles of Syracuse; two sisters, Miss Abbie G. Miles of village and Mrs. Nellie Luckering Seneca Falls. Mr. Miles was a respected man, dependable in work, and likeable in his ways, and he will be mourned by many friends.

Vatican Library Has Shelf Room For 400,000 Books

Vatican City, June 25.—Premier formerly occupied by the Vatican mosaic factory and now given over by His Holiness Pope Pius XI to the Vatican library are being equipped with new American-made shelving capable of accommodating 400,000 volumes. Four Thousand Holy Name Members Take Part In Annual Rally of Archdiocese Society

Newburgh, June 25.—Four thousand Holy Name men took part in the annual rally of the Holy Name Union of the Archdiocese of New York, held here Sunday, with the New York police brass band attracting particular attention. St. Patrick's church, largest in the city, was unable to hold the mass, and an overflow meeting was held in Columbus Hall. The delegates were welcomed by the Very Rev. Mr. Henry O'Carroll, rector of St. Patrick's, who compared the Holy Name men to the Crusaders. "They were called," he said, "to rescue the Holy Sepulchre from infidel. You are called to an even higher mission, for you are to rescue the name of Jesus, our Lord and Saviour, from the mouth of the infidel, and you are called upon also to discourage all forms of immorality and perjury." Arthur E. O'Leary, a Right St. Gregory, spoke of Catholic devotion. An announcement was made that the next year, the 50th anniversary of the Holy Name Society will be observed in New York City with a parade in which more than 100,000 men would participate.

Catholic Educational Association Holds Annual Meeting, With 6,000 in Attendance

Philadelphia, June 25.—The annual meeting of the Catholic Educational Association of America was held here this week opening on Monday. Four thousand delegates were present at the opening session, and 2,000 others came before the convention closed. Many hundreds of schools and colleges were represented by delegates from all parts of the country. The opening session was in the nature of an informal reception, at which Cardinal Dougherty presided. Training young women in domestic duties was discussed early in the convention. Modernistic tendencies were decried by the Rev. Dr. Francis V. Corcoran of Missouri, chairman of the section. "If we permit our students to be mere imitators we might as well close the doors of our institutions," he said. "If they are not going to lead and stand for something higher than convention, then might as well admit that our tin labor and sacrifice have been useless."
