New Shrine to Jesuit Martyrs At Auriesville

A beautiful new shrine, erected in loving memory of the Jesuit martyrs who gave their lives for the Church here centuries ago, was dedicated Sunday by the Rt. Rev. Edmund F. Gibbons, D.D., Bishop of Albany, in the presence of 10,000 persons. The shrine has a seating capacity of 5,000. It is built like a colonnade and is 275 feet in diameter, with eight sections, one for each of the North American missionaries canonized last year. The sanctuary has a diameter of 72 feet.

A chorus sang the Mass of the North American martyrs, composed for the occasion by Hugh P. Donlon. The dedication sermon was preached by the Rev. Charles F. Connor, S.J., of the Maryland-New York Province of the Jesuit Mission Band. He pictured the sufferings of the saints in whose memory the shrine was founded, but paid particular attention to St. Isaac Jogues. "EIGHT MONK INDIANS from Castiglione, who were killed near Montreal, attended the ceremonies, and led the procession to the shrine for afternoon services. The ceremonies in the shrine ended the first of the many Sunday pilgrimages planned at the shrine for the summer. The Rt. Rev. Thomas C. O'Reilly, D.D., Bishop of Saratoga, was among the church dignitaries present at the dedication of the shrine.

Court Upholds Bible Reading in N. Y. Schools

New York, June 26—The Appellate Division Wednesday upheld without an opinion the decision of Supreme Court Justice Ford refusing an injunction sought by Joseph Lewis, president of the Freethinkers of America, to restrain the New York City Board of Education from continuing the reading of the Bible in the public schools. Mr. Lewis sued as a taxpayer on the ground that the use of public money for Bible instruction in the public schools was unauthorized, and a waste of city funds.

O'Sullivan Dies, Man Who Invented The Rubber Heels

Lowell, Mass., June 26—Tread lightly on your rubber heels. O'Sullivan is dead—the man who invented them. He passed away at his home here Monday, respected, honored, beloved. Humphrey O'Sullivan was his full name. He was a good Irishman, a loyal son of the Church, and six years ago Pope Benedict made him a Knight of St. Gregory. A brother was associated with him in the manufacture of the famous O'Sullivan rubber heels. Fifteen years ago they sold out to a trust, and retired happy, wealthy and kindly to the poor and the needy. Seneca Falls Minister Calls The Catholic Church the World's Most Remarkable Organization

Presbyterian Preacher Asks His People to Cast Aside All Slanders Against Our Church and Study Its Work and Its Organization.

Seneca Falls, June 26.—The Rev. Robert D. Merrill, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of this village, closed his series of Thursday evening sermons last week by giving an eloquent and sincere tribute to the Catholic Church. He spoke of "Our Friends of Other Folds," and his words made a deep impression upon his people. He spoke in part as follows:

"Let us lay aside all other slanders about the Roman Catholic Church, of which there are many, let us lay aside also the half truths which distort facts and let us try to focus on some points of Catholic organization and practices which are of clear value. There are some Protestants who list the Roman Catholics as neither friends nor Christians." Mr. Merrill continued. "Bigotry is to be found in every group of persons, and it is very hard to get it so widespread makes it worth while to try to understand others better, for as we understand others we come to appreciate and like them better. For some things, there is no question of the efficiency of the Roman Catholic organization. It is a world-wide; it is well knit; it has remarkable unity and all diversity of race and nation and language, and it has all the efficiency of a strong constitutional monarchy. It is probably the most remarkable organization in history. The Roman church has always had a strong hold on the socially lowly; it has never been the church of any one class, but the church of the people. It has done much in the shaping of such lives morally and spiritually. Catholic history affords many instances of beautiful and truly saintly lives; whether canonized or uncanonized, real saints there have been and still are. Whether such lives are found in Catholic or in Protestant records, they are part of the great Christian inheritance."

Auburn, June 26.—The silver jubilee of St. Hyacinth's Church will be celebrated here Sunday morning, June 28th, and the celebration will be continued until the following Sunday evening, July 5th, when a parish banquet will be held in Falcon Hall, Falcon Street.

The Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will participate at the Jubilee Mass here at 10 o'clock Sunday morning, and many priests from various parts of the Diocese will be present, including the Rev. Joseph J. Sweeney, pastor of St. Stanislaus' Church in Acworth, Ga., the founder and first pastor of St. Hyacinth's Church. Father Sweeney will be an honored guest throughout the week, and he will be given a great welcome by all the parishioners. Father Jerome, pastor, and Father Julius, assistant pastor, are having the cooperation of the president and members of the various societies of the parish.

Many activities for each morning, afternoon and evening during the week are being arranged. Each day will open with services at the church. There will be pageants, parades, athletic contests, concerts, banquets, games, banquets, fireworks and other events. Invitations have been sent to members of the various Polish parishes in this part of the state. Large delegations are expected from Syracuse, Rochester, Utica, Buffalo and Schenectady.
