

Horse Show To Open Labor Day, The 21st Event

Third Cavalry From Virginia, Uncle Sam's Crack Riders, a Feature

Brookport Fair To Be Combined

With Uncle Sam's crack troop of Rough Riders, the Third Cavalry from Fort Meyer, Virginia, as the stellar attraction, the Rochester Exposition and Horse Show which opens at Memorial Park on Labor Day is planning to give the biggest entertainment value in its history.

"We shall not let the Exposition's 21st birthday go uncelebrated," said William B. Boothby, general manager of the Exposition. The program of the fair is the most elaborate ever given in Rochester and the surrounding area an exposition ranking with the best in the country has been realized. Every year that we do better, we are spurred to greater efforts.

The Exposition forces under Mr. Boothby's leadership is now engaged with the task of absorbing many more of the Monroe County fair, held for many years at Brookport. The association which has sponsored the county fair has decided not to hold a fair this year. There probably will be no more fairs at Brookport.

This year the show at Exposition Park will be known as the Rochester Exposition and Horse Show, with Monroe County Fair combined. The Rochester Exposition has kept its name and the Monroe County fair committee in Monroe and nearby counties for many years. Now that it is charged with the responsibility of taking the place of the Brookport fair, it will put on a cattle show to increase its appeal to residents from outside the city.

"Everything points to good entries in all classes and a full quota of concession holders," said Mr. Boothby. "An particularly encouraging with the prospect for the Horse Show. Several of our former exhibitors who have not been with us for a number of years say they will return. We are already assured of three new exhibitors, those of August A. Busch, Jr., of St. Louis, Frank Adams of Atlanta, Ga., and J. U. Kuhns of Greensburg, Pa. There is a possibility that we may have exhibitors from the Pacific Coast."

The pilgrimage will be conducted by Father Van der Meulen, and the boat will leave the Sumnerville dock at 10:15 p. m., on Tuesday, July 15, for the Saguenay River for arrival in Montreal at 6 p. m. on the 16th, with a stop of only one-half hour there; arrive in the Saguenay River on the evening of the 23rd, leaving on the morning of the 24th; arrive in Quebec at 7:45 p. m. on Friday, the 24th; leave Quebec at 8 p. m. Sunday, the 25th; arrive in Montreal at 7 a. m. Monday, the 27th, and leave at 9:05 a. m. by special train from the Bonaventure station; arrive in Prescott at 11:40 a. m. on Tuesday. The itinerary of the boat, leaving there at 11:50, and arriving home in Rochester at 10:30 Monday evening, the 27th.

The rate to Quebec and return is \$48.50, and to Saguenay River and return is \$55.15, including meals and berth on the steamers. This annual pilgrimage to the Shrine of St. Anne always attracts many people, and it is expected that the crowd this year will be large one.

The funeral Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Howard Geck, chaplain at the convent, with Rev. A. A. Hughes as deacon, and Rev. Louis Edelman, sub-deacon. The final blessing was given by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hara, D.D., Bishop of Rochester. The Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., was in the sanctuary. The Rev. Joseph Guilfoili of Montezuma pronounced the blessing at the grave in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

Sister M. Anacletus entered the order of the Sisters of St. Joseph in this city 53 years ago, and from that day to the day of her death was a faithful and devoted worker in every task that was given her. For many years Sister M. Anacletus was in Canada during the old St. Joseph's Home at Auburn. For the past 15 years she had been stationed at the convent on Lake View Park. She was 80 years of age at her death, and had been ill for a long time.

Sister M. Anacletus was greatly beloved by her associates, and by hundreds of children and others for whom she had worked zealously and faithfully during her long and self-sacrificing life in the Sisterhood here. Many prayers will be happily treasured. She leaves several nieces and nephews, including Dr. J. C. O'Brien of Auburn, Miss Louise O'Brien of Rochester, and Rev. Joseph Guilfoili.

The program will include the "Merry Widow" waltz by German Schumann's "Symphony No. 1," "Woodland Whispers" by Calzavola, the Overture Opus by von Weber, Wieniawski's "Romance" and the Overture "Fairy Dance" by Suppe.

An all-Schubert concert will be broadcast over the Symphony Orchestra, Maurice Baron conducting, over an NBC-WHAM network at 6:45 P. M. Monday, July 13.
