Two professors of English at Southen Methodist university published a hook, "Famous Editions of English Poets," in which 18 volumes of verse ste reproduced in full, just as they appeared in the originals, with photomahae coples of the old title pages. This involved a vast amount of labor and research, and was done at Oxford university and the British museum, where original copies of such works as Shakespeare's sonnets. Pope's "Essay on Criticism," Byron's "The Prisoner of Chillon" and Tennyson's poems were available for copying. On returning to this country, the Texas Weekly relates, the scholars were surprised to learn that all the rare volthey had consulted overseas umes could have been found in libraries of their own state. ## Story of Samson Found in Oriental Literature

Discoveries on the size of the anclent city of Beth-Shemesh, in Palestine, by the Haverford college and archeological expedition, confirm the scientific supposition that this gray mound on the border between Dan and Judah was once a part of Egypt's domain, once Philistine, once Hebrew, once Roman, once Byzantine; but il would have been more interesting if the American archeologists had found something like a visiting card of the glant Samson, or a bit of jewelry with the monorram of a lady named Delllab, in the rulns. For it is supposed that it was here, at Beth-Shemesh, that the famous betrayal of Samaonthe shearing of the luxuriant Locks, which remited in the loss of his Herculean nowers-took place. Modern criticism is inclined to make rather light of the feats of Samson, as recorded in the Scriptures. Similar tales of a minantic hero-even of his temp tation and fall-are found in oriental literatures that go before the Hebrews.

## More Shame to Them

Medieval Clocks Into the making of clocks and their cases has gone much of man's inventive and decorative abilities. Comic and performing clocks had a great vogue during the Fifteenth and Mixtoouth centuries. In the museum at Basle, Switzerland, may still be seen a mecimen in which the vibration of the mendulum gradually caused a long tongue to protrude. Other clocks ware made to show a whole series of scenes, such as processions of the apostles and other characters. Great interest was also excited by clocks representing the positions of the heavenly body ies and the days of the week and month. Repeating clocks which sounded the hours when a string was pulled were prized in the days when the only method of striking a light at night was with Mint and stool.
