Teachers of Diocese Will Hold Institute On September 3 and 4

Annual Conference, Held At Aquinas Institute, Will Be Featured by a Program That Will Be Unusually Helpful and Practical—Noted Educators Will Take Part in the Program on Both Days.

LECTURES BY DR. AVERY W. SKINNER AND REV. EDWARD BETOWSKI TO BE FEATURES

The 29th annual conference, or institute, of the Diocesan School Association of Rochester will be held in Aquinas Institute on Thursday and Friday next week, September 3d and 4th. An unusually practical and helpful program has been arranged for both days. Teachers from all parts of the Diocese will be present at the conference. Several noted educators will be present, including Dr. Avery W. Skinner of the State Department of Education; Rev. Edward Betowski, S.T.B., of St. Joseph's Seminary, Tonawanda, N. Y., and Professor James M. Spinning, vice-principal and head of the English department at West High School, Rochester. Bishop O'Hern will act as chairman of the conference, will give the opening address and make the closing announcements.

This will be the first time the conference has been held before the opening of the Diocesan schools. Heretofore, the conferences were held immediately after the close of the school year. It is considered a more advantageous time for most of the teachers to have the conference just before the opening of school.

A program has been prepared which should have a strong appeal for teachers of all departments. After the opening address by Bishop O'Hern, the Rev. Edward Betowski, S.T.B., a clear thinker, able educator and fine speaker, will talk on "Pedagogic Integration." He is sure to be heard with appreciation by all the teachers. Father Betowski will also speak on the second day of the conference, on "Reflection in Study."

Dr. Skinner to Lecture

Dr. Avery W. Skinner, B.A., Ph.D., chief of the examination and inspection division of the State Department of Education, will deliver three lectures to teachers of grades five to eight. The first will be on "The Relation of Geography to History," the second, "Making the Past Real," and the third, "The Place of History in the Curriculum." Dr. Skinner has taken part on other occasions in the proceedings of the Catholic Teachers' Conferences in Rochester, and he is popular here.

Prof. James M. Spinning, vice-principal and head of the English department of West High School, Rochester, will give two lectures to the high school teachers, "The Place for Formal Grammar" and "Extensive and Intensive Reading."

Irish People Will Welcome Papal Legate

Government of Irish Free State Will Extend Welcome to Pope's Representative at Congress.

Dublin, Aug. 28.—The Eucharistic Congress Committee, in arrangement with the Ministry for External Affairs, announces that the Government has undertaken all the arrangements in connection with the reception of the Cardinal Legate, at Dune Loaghair, on Monday evening, June 20, 1932. The reception will be surrounded with all the dignity possible, it is announced.

After the reception at Dun Loaghair, His Eminence will proceed to the city. There, at the Pro-Cathedral, he will be received by His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin and his Chapter and all the visiting Cardinals and Bishops.

At the formal opening of the Congress in the Pro-Cathedral, on Wednesday, June 22, the Apostolic Letters will be read in Latin and English. His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin will then address the assembled Cardinals and Bishops.

His Grace's address will be followed by an address by His Lordship the Bishop of Amnagh, Chairman of the Permanent Committee of the International Eucharistic Congress.

The Cardinal Legate will then deliver an address, which will be followed by the reading of a special message from His Holiness, the Pope, solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will follow.

The dispatches said Chinese Government troops were besieging the gang, headed by the bandit leader, Liu Kwei-tang, in an effort to free the prisoners. The missionaries were described as belonging to the Nazarene, Mennonite and National Holiness Churches.

Effort to End Irish Faction Troubles Made

Army Council of the Irish Republic Issues an Order—Armed Men Burn Hut Used by Boy Scouts.

Dublin, Aug. 28.—A remarkable document has been issued here by the "Army Council of the Irish Republic," bearing on recent disturbances in the County Caran and elsewhere along the border of the Free State and Northern Ireland and calling for volunteers to suppress the sectarian strife. In spite of this manifesto it seems that the "Army Council" is unable to control its own forces.

Sunday night a particularly disgraceful outrage occurred in Dunleer, County Lough. A party of 16 Boy Scouts, members of the Baden Powell organization, were camping on the McChinock estate. After midnight, when the boys had gone to bed, their camp was surrounded by 20 armed men. The older boys were ordered out of the hut in which they were sleeping while the younger boys were dragged out by the raiders.

One section of the invaders kept the scouts covered with revolvers while others poured gasoline on the wooden hut and set it afire. The boys' belongings were destroyed. Then the armed men fired shots into the air and decamped in two motor cars.

Fr. Coughlin Will Continue His Broadcasts

Popular Radio Speaker, Eliminated from the Columbia Broadcasting System, Seeks Other Sources.

Detroit, Aug. 28.—The action of the Columbia Broadcasting Company in substituting the Church of the Air to replace the special broadcasting of religious sermons, has made it necessary for Rev. Charles E. Coughlin to arrange a "look-up" for his radio broadcasts. He shall talk to large audiences as he has in the past.

Father Coughlin, in his sermons last Fall and Winter, attacked the money-kings of Wall Street, Henry Ford, Thomas Edison and others. It is said that Catholic officials had Father Coughlin's broadcasts in mind when considering the change in policy announced last week.

Father Coughlin will endeavor to secure a look-up in many cities as possible over which he may resume his sermons on October 4th.

Father Coughlin, who is a radio station WJLB, Detroit, is working and that it includes station WGR, Newark; WGAR, Cleveland; WGR, Toledo; WLW, Cincinnati; KETP, St. Paul; WTIC, Hartford; WEEI, Boston; WPAQ, Worcester; WGSN, Portland, and WJAK, Providence.

Officers Seek Man Who Posed As Millionaire

Smooth Swindler Defrauds Priest After Promising to Give Half Million to Catholic Charities.

Windsor, Ont., Aug. 28.—A confidence man who posed as the son of a millionaire steel magnate and promised to donate \$500,000 to Catholic charities and institutions was sought today for swindling the Rev. Jacques Nyenhuis, S.J.

He was reported to be in Toledo, Ohio, Saturday and Father Nyenhuis and a Windsor police officer went there yesterday to join the search.

The Rev. Nyenhuis, who is a member of the Board of Catholic Charities, had been promised \$100,000 for the hospital and for a "new parish" to be established in Cleveland, Ohio. Miss Claire Dugal, a nurse at the hospital, was promised a position at secretary in the two men.

Father Nyenhuis said the man gave him his name Burke and claimed to be the son of a millionaire steel magnate who died recently in Buffalo, N. Y.

After giving Father Nyenhuis two checks for \$50,000 Burke bought an automobile in Detroit with a check the price of which was \$10,000. Burke has not been delivered.

Priest Predicts Death Of Organized Bigotry Here Within Next Twenty Years

Says Political and Financial Motives Are Back of Professional Bigoted Movements—Klan Took in \$90,000,000 in Ten Years.

New York, Aug. 28.—The Rev. Joseph A. Daly, Professor of Psychology in the College of Mount St. Vincent, predicted in a recent address broadcast from Radio Station WLWY that "within 20 years religious intolerance in its organized form will be fairly extinct in the United States."

"Ordinary prejudice or misunderstandings," he said, "exist much as expressions of very human nature. These usually can be cleared up, or at least made harmless, by better knowledge and closer examination. It is for this purpose that such instruments exist as Station WLWY.

"But organized bigotry is something else again. The cycles of religious intolerance will seem to occur periodically in our land as always sponsored by sharp-witted organizers with a political or financial axe to grind. As to politics, one can consult the records of the Glyn campaign for President in 1918, and particularly the bright pages of the Presidential campaign of 1924. Again, in 1925, the same weapon was used in behalf of Senator Healy in Alabama and Robinson in Kentucky and against Senator Norris in Nebraska. But evidently the edge had worn off because Healy and Robinson were defeated and Norris re-elected.
