### C. J. Milliken

Of Elmira Named K. of C. Deputy

Elmira, Sept. 11.—Cornelius J. Milliken, grand knight of Elmira Council, Knights of Columbus, has been appointed Deputy of the district, which includes Elmira and several neighboring places. The appointment has just been announced by State Deputy William J. Armstrong of Albany.  
Mr. Milliken has been an active worker and untiring leader in K. of C. circles in this city for several years. He has served for some time as Grand Knight of Elmira Council, and under his leadership many worth while activities have been held by the Council. His many friends will congratulate him upon the honor that has come to him, and will wish him well in his new office in this great Catholic fraternity.

### Commanders Who Defied

● Mighty Power of Rome

Elmira was a Catholic general, named Bares (Latin), whose warlike conceptions were derided by his greater son, Hannibal. Hannibal came into prominence in the sixteenth year of the First Punic War (247 B. C.). He landed in Sicily, near Paestum, and, against the strength of the Greeks, with a small band of mercenaries, he waged war for three years against Rome. In 243 he occupied Mount Eryx, and stood at bay against a Roman army. His master's cooperation was to release the town of Mytilene, at Sicily, from Roman rule. He then sailed for Spain in 237, in nine years built up a new dominion; but in 228 he fell fighting against the Vedones. His son, Hasdrubal, was born in 247 B. C. and in his sixth year his father made him a Roman ally. In the Second Punic War, Hannibal left New Carthage in 218 with 80,000 feet, 12,000 horses and 10 elephants. He crossed the Pyrenees, gained the Rhone, defeated the Gauls, and crossed the Alps in autumn 218. His troops, reared in Africa and Spain, perished in the mountains and he and snow. Remarkable achievements against Rome followed, with many victories and much slaughter, but at last Hannibal was weakened by his heavy losses. When the Romans demanded his surrender he took poison and died about 188 B. C.
