to all that this world could offer him—riches, preferment, honors—all he gave up for his beloved seminary and its God-given work. Let our contribution this year be a real indication of our desire to approach at least to some extent the magnificent devotion to St. Andrew's Seminary that marked the life of the revered and now lamented Mgr. Nolan. The will of Mgr. Nolan made St. Andrew's Seminary recipient of his entire library of 1,200 volumes. Mgr. Joseph S. Canavan and Rev. Thomas F. Connors gave a number of volumes to the library. Priests and lay people of the diocese have made appreciated donations of money and of needed articles, which are given in detail in the annual Seminary Report. St. Andrew House, opened two years ago to serve as a home for students of St. Andrew's Seminary from outside the city of Rochester, has been the recipient of donations of money from priests and others who are specially interested in its work. We would appreciate the kindly interest of all our people in St. Andrew House, and would recommend its prosing needs especially to our Catholic people in the parishes outside the city of Rochester. We feel that many will be well-disposed to assist St. Andrew House, and with confidence refer the matter to them and their generous hearts.

A New Epoch

St. Andrew's Seminary enters on a new epoch in its history with the addition of a sixth year to its course beginning with the present fall term. The extension is in keeping with the law of the Church concerning preparatory seminaries. The fifth year class last June numbered 23, of whom 14 entered St. Bernard's this September, while practically all the others were invited to return to St. Andrew's for the sixth year. Because of increased registration, and also because of the extra year added, the faculty has been increased by the addition of two new professors, making the total 12. This adds to the expense of conducting the school, but we must make proper provision for the greatly enlarged student body now registered with us.

We will on next Sunday place before our faithful people the seminary appeal as it refers to St. Bernard's Seminary in particular. Meanwhile, we ask your prayers for the welfare of our seminary, that God's blessing may be upon them, and that He may continue to imbue our Catholic men and women with a most generous spirit in making their contribution on Seminary Sunday, October 4. Asylum Hall Is Dedicated By the Bishop

On Tuesday evening this week the substantial new Recreation Hall, erected during the past three months at St. Patrick's Girls' Asylum on Clifton Street, was dedicated by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, and was formally opened to the public for inspection. There was a capacity audience of friends of the asylum in the delightful new assembly hall, and everybody was well entertained by the children of the asylum. They gave a delightful program, including the following numbers:

Greeting songs, dumb bell drills, country dances, the Rose drill, folk dances, and a Girl Scout number were greatly enjoyed. These were presented with an eloquence and skill that delighted all. The singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" closed this part of the program.

Bishop O'Hern thanked all for coming. He told how the new hall was built through a generous bequest in the will of a former Rochesterian, Robert E. Jennings of Montclair, N. J., and said a bronze tablet will be erected in the hall to perpetuate his memory and his generosity. He told of the good influence of healthy recreation in the lives of the young, and spoke in glowing terms of the splendid character of the girls of the asylum by the good Sisters of St. Joseph. His talk was greatly enjoyed.

A silver loving cup, donated by Mrs. Theodore D. Steinhilber, was presented to one of the Girl Scouts, Miss Tiller, for making the best progress in swimming during the summer months. Mrs. Steinhilber was introduced to the audience by Bishop O'Hern, and she spoke inappreciably.

Following the program the audience inspected the building, and found it a delightful and spacious one, with plenty of room to play, and for games and recreation.
