Silver Jubilee of Church Of St. Anthony of Padua Will Be Celebrated On October 18

The Church of St. Anthony of Padua, the first church for Italian people in Rochester, established 25 years ago by the Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, D.D., first Bishop of Rochester, will celebrate its silver jubilee in a fitting manner on Sunday, Oct. 18. A feature of the celebration will be a Pontifical Mass by the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, at 11 o'clock, assisted by several prelates of the city and by all members of the Italian clergy of the Diocese.

Present at the ceremonies will be Car. Ur. Casaro Scametti, representative of the Italian Crown in Rochester, the religious societies of the church and of the lay societies of the West Side, a representation of the Italian World War Veterans and of the Order of the Sons of Italy, and also of the Societa' Iunite of the East Side.

The celebration naturally will be consonant to the occasion, which, in one word, will be one glorious hymn of thanksgiving to God for the innumerable benefits He has bestowed upon the Italian colony in these 25 years.

Forty Hours Devotion. Proceeding will be the Forty Hours Devotion, which began on Wednesday evening at 7:30 and will close with solemn procession Saturday night. There will be general Communion Sunday morning. At the 7 and 8 o'clock Masses, the members of the societies of the parish, numbering closely to 1,500, will receive; the children at the 9 o'clock Mass and the young people at the 10 o'clock. At the Pontifical Mass at 11 o'clock the Rev. Dr. De Giamoni, ex-archbishop in the World War, will preach. And since the dead in their day contributed not a little to the success now being enjoyed, three Masses on Monday morning, at 6:30, 8 and 9 o'clock, will be celebrated for the repose of their souls, the last being solemn.

This parish alone in the 25 years of its existence has issued 3,122 burial permits.

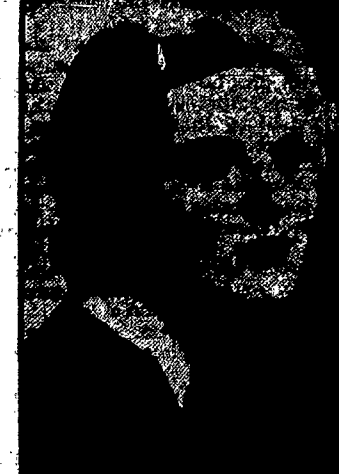
