

Silver Jubilee Of St. Patrick's New York City

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary of Consecration of Cathedral Celebrated in Presence of Congregation of Four Thousand.

New York, Oct. 15.—The silver jubilee of the consecration of St. Patrick's Cathedral was celebrated with a solemn religious service in the cathedral Sunday morning. The edifice, dedicated 53 and one-half years ago; it was consecrated on Oct. 4, 1876, after an \$850,000 mortgage had been paid.

Cardinal Hayes presided, and at the end of the mass pronounced the apostolic benediction upon more than 4,000 kneeling persons. The Right Rev. John J. Durkin, auxiliary bishop of the archdiocese, sang the mass. The Sisters of Charity, who teach in the cathedral schools, occupied the front pews in front of the Cardinal's throne.

Mgr. Lavelle said he recalled "the story of the day" when three Cardinals assisted at the Pontifical Mass which marked the consecration of the cathedral and that all have now come to their centenary. He said that three were: Vincenzo Vanthulle of Rome, Michael Logue of Ireland, and James Gibbons of Baltimore.

"The aim of the cathedral has been always to be a real mother to the entire archdiocese," said Mgr. Lavelle. "The Catholics of the diocese, the social departments come here in a body for an annual communion mass. The Knights of Columbus, the Holy Name Society, the Catholic Daughters of America, all have their annual memorial masses."

Father Hubbard Tells How He Escaped Death at Volcano Over Which He Flew

Priest-Scientist and Companions Were Nearly Drawn Into Mouth of Great Crater by Terrific Suction—Ashes Found 300 Miles Away.

New York, Oct. 15.—The Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, head of the geology department at the University of Santa Clara, Cal., visiting this city, told this week how he and his two companions came within an ace of being drawn to their deaths in their airplane into the mouth of the great Aniakchak volcano, in Alaska, when Father Hubbard was making explorations there last May. This was his first detailed story of his adventures.

Father Hubbard flew to the volcanic mountain in a Pacific International plane, piloted by Harry Blunt and Al Monson. The three members of his student party were Diet Douglas of Georgetown University, Bill Regan of Santa Clara and Kenneth Oshimoh of the University of San Francisco.

New Death of Crater "Our chief interest in the flight," Father Hubbard said, "was in finding out what had happened on the peninsula, as ashes had been falling in the interior since early in May."

Has New Shrine

The beautiful new Shrine of the Little Flower, erected in the form of a giant Crucifix Tower, 125 feet in height, was dedicated Sunday at Royal Oak, Michigan, 12 miles from Detroit. Joseph Schrembs, Bishop of Cleveland; Governor Brucker of Michigan; Mayor Murphy of Detroit; and Father Coughlin.

Between 4 and 5 P. M. every Sunday Father Coughlin will broadcast from this shrine. Rochester listeners may get him through one of the Buffalo Stations.

This was and is an unfounded conception, and such a thing is not pending.

The Paulist Fathers present a program over WLWL each week day from 6 to 7:45 p. m. and at 3:30 each Sunday afternoon. At 8 o'clock each Sunday evening the services in the Paulist Fathers' church are broadcast. Excellent programs are given at each broadcast, with musical numbers, a question box, an address and other features.

Minister Says

Pope's Appeal Wins Approval

Methodist Clergyman in New York Commends Recent Apostolic Letter on Unemployment.

New York, Oct. 15.—The recent Apostolic Epistle of Pope Pius XI will arouse almost universal approval among Protestants, the Rev. Dr. George Maychin Stockdale, pastor of the St. James Methodist Church, declared in his sermon here Sunday morning.

"Only a man blessed with bigotry's blight could withhold support of the Pontiff's heartfelt appeal for children," said Dr. Stockdale. "How heartening it is to hear this most powerful Bishop in Christendom calling 'all who possess a sense of faith and love' to a crusade of charity and relief 'in order to rid our earth of the plague of unemployment.' If any think the Pope's words are too strong about the suffering among children, let him remember that the Supreme Pontiff of the Catholic Church speaks for the peoples of the entire earth. By comparison to some of the suffering elsewhere on the earth, the suffering in America is a candle to the moon.

"Not always, to be sure, are we able to agree with everything that the occupant of the ancient Chair of St. Peter has to say to the world. Yet for this recent Apostolic Epistle we have nothing but the highest praise.

"When to save humanity from disaster the Pope calls the nations of earth to cease from 'the unbridled race for armaments,' we say, 'Long live the Pope!'"

Many Alaskans killed
"In the crater itself, a rift four miles long opened into a vast building up a new cone within the old one, was three miles in circumference. The mountain continued erupting for eleven consecutive days until May 11. At noon that day lanterns had to be used at Chignik, sixty miles away from the crater. The fall of ashes was measured at Chignik as a pound an hour in a square foot.

"As we flew along we saw dead reindeer and caribou from our plane and the bodies of seals and other water fowl floating down the river, killed by inhaling the ashes. Inside the crater all the flowers, plants and animal life met total obliteration. After the final explosion on May 11, the volcano quieted for a few days and then gathered up its activities culminated in a major eruption on May 20, which lasted for a week. It sounded like the pounding of distant surf to the fishermen at Bristol Bay.

"For the next six weeks we explored every foot of the thirty square miles inside the volcano rim, identifying signs, gathering specimens of the rocks, and thoroughly photographing the entire region. We took 18,000 feet of motion pictures and 2,000 still photographs.

"Father Hubbard will return to Alaska in January to start another expedition. He is making only a hurried trip East to give a motion picture illustrated lecture at the Brooklyn Academy of Music next Tuesday for the benefit of the Alaskan missions.
