Bishop to Speak At Armistic Day Luncheon Event

The Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D.D., Bishop of Rochester, will be among the speakers on Armistic Day, Wednesday, November 11, celebrated by the women of Rochester at a luncheon program at 12:30 in the Chamber of Commerce main dining room.

Kirby Page, editor of "The World Tomorrow," and internationally known lecturer and writer will give the address. Others taking part in the program are: Rabbi Jeremiah J. Bernan, of Temple Beth El and the Rev. Samuel Tyler of St. Luke's Episcopal Church.

As a special feature, commemorating the declaration of peace in 1918, representatives of fifteen nationalities will be seated at the speakers table.

Plane Carries Sick Sister From the Far North to Edmonton, Where She Was Operated Quickly

Edmonton, Alberta, Oct. 30.—Out of the night a radio flashed—"Hydroplane direct to Edmonton tomorrow—stopping to refuel—urgent flight with sick sister—help asked." The message came from Fort Norman and was picked up at Resolution; it was passed on to the Catholic Mission there.

At dawn, the next morning the priest was with the mechanics at the water edge scanning the heavens over Great Slave Lake. Towards 8 o'clock the drone of a motor in the northwest announced the approach of a tiny speck quickly growing larger. In a few minutes the plane was skimming over the surface of the water. Through the opening of the fuselage the priest could discern the coronets of two Sisters of Charity. One lay on a sort of stretcher, the other was seated beside her. The missionary climbed into the machine and finding the sister unable to take nourishment asked the pilot to try to make Edmonton before night.

A beloved sister, Sister Francoise, a native of Quebec, had been nursing the sick among the Indians and Eskimoes in the regions of the Arctic Circle for twelve years. Many times she had risked her life among smallpox victims of the North. Now she was being rushed back to civilization with an acute attack of appendicitis.

The refueling was done. The plane taxied quickly across the crystal surface of the water and once again was in the air on its flight south. As it rose it pushed its nose into strong head winds, and the rush of contrary currents made the plane slip and jump, causing torturing pain in the suffering nun.

After some hours of flying they were passing over the regions to the north of Alaska. The gasoline
