

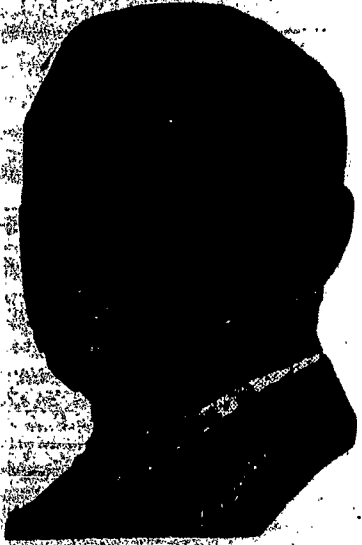

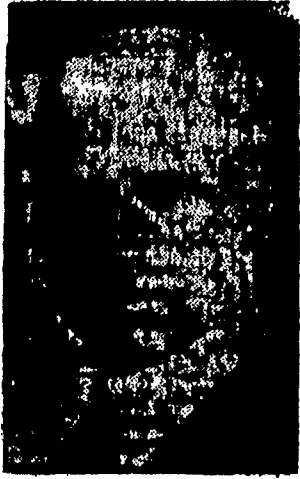
For Supreme Court Justice

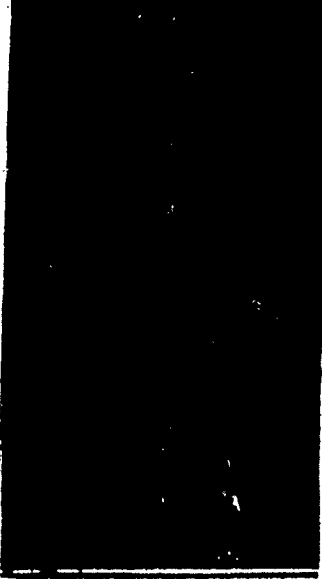
For Assembly Fifth District

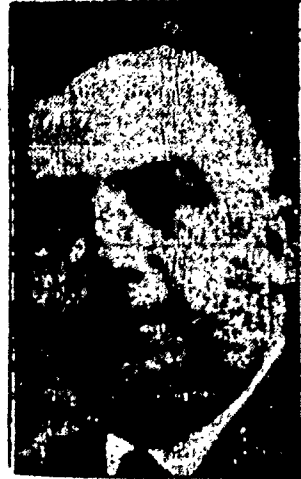
For Assembly Fourth District

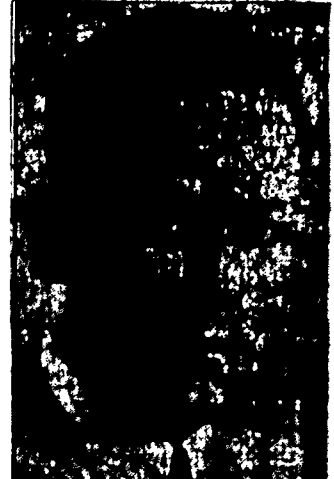
For Assembly Second District

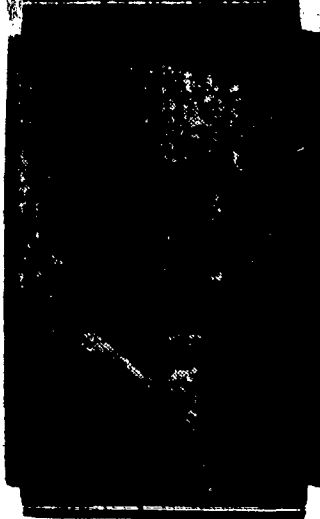
For Sheriff

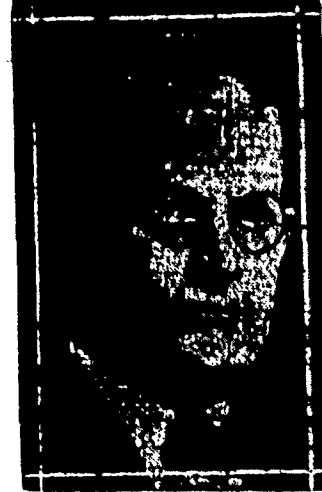
For Member of Board of Education

He is probably the best known man in fraternal and political circles in Rochester, and in character and ability he is classed A1.

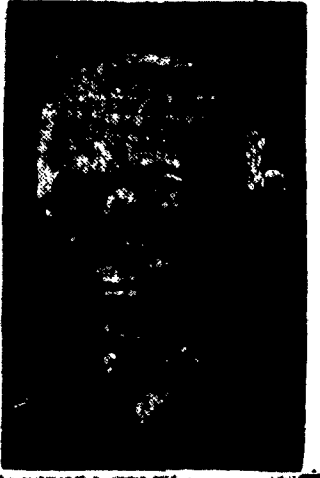
Candidate for Coroner

For City Councilman Northwest District

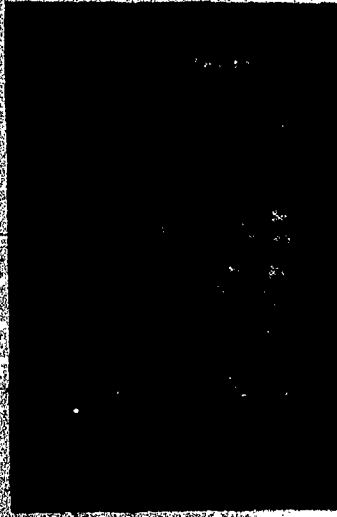


NELSON A. MILNE

For Councilman at Large

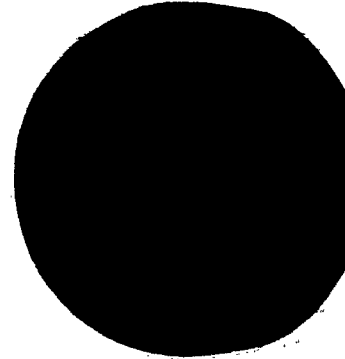


LEROY E. SNYDER

For City Councilman South District

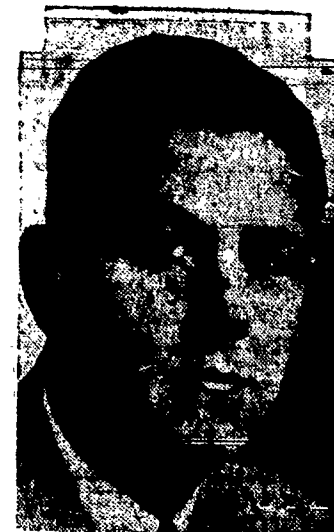


HAROLD S. W. MACFARLIN
