Council of Catholic Men Adopts By-Laws and Elects Officers At Meeting Sunday

Representatives of Five Deaneries Are Guests of Bishop O'Hern At Dinner Here—Plea for the Unemployed is Made.

Sunday noon the officers of the five deaneries of the Diocese of Rochester who make up the Diocesan Council of Catholic Men, were guests at a dinner meeting of the Rt. Rev. John Francis O'Hern, D. D., Bishop of Rochester, at Columbus Civic Center. The meeting was called for the purpose of organizing the Council in a definite way. It was well attended, and was most enthusiastic.

A constitution and bylaws were adopted and officers elected. Rev. Leo C. Mooney was appointed spiritual director by Bishop O'Hern. Frederick J. Mix, president of Rochester Deanery, was elected president of the Diocesan Council. Edmund H. Maloney, president of Elmira Deanery, vice-president. Charles A. Tucker of Rochester, secretary and William J. Hauser of Rochester, treasurer.

Bishop O'Hern spoke to the delegates and urged them to assist their pastors in every way to alleviate distress and unemployment in parishes of the diocese. He also urged participation in the work of public relief committees in every community and assisting in community chest work in all cities of the diocese which have a community chest plan. The Bishop also recommended the formation of nocturnal adoration societies for all communities having more than one church. The purpose and method of formation of the societies was explained by Mr. Tucker.

Resolutions Well Received. Charles F. Dolle, executive secretary of Washington, spoke of behalf of the National Council of Catholic Men. He said the resolutions passed by that body last month had been favorably received by press and people as a timely expression of Catholic laymen of the country on moral and economic questions and problems of the day. He also talked upon the favorable reception of the Catholic broadsheet, "The Catholic Worker," by the National Council of Catholic Men.

La's Leaders Needed. Father Mooney, the newly appointed spiritual director, spoke on the need for lay leaders, and Rev. Gerald Lambert, assistant director of the Columbus Civic Center spoke on the need of assistance in the question of the Center activities.
