

### Rockne Memorial Campaign To Raise Million Dollars Finds Co-operating Force in Rochester

The Rockne Memorial Campaign, to raise one million dollars for the erection of a building to his memory at Notre Dame University, was launched last week throughout the Nation.

Wherever there were a few Notre Dame alumni who know and revere "Rock", there was a gathering and a radio broadcast, nationwide in its scope as well as in its reception, brought them together. Starting at New York where more than 200 gathered, Mayor James J. Walker, Grantland Rice, sports writer and Harry Stuhldreher, one of the famous "Four Horsemen", opened the radio speeches.

Elmer Layden, another "Horseman" continued from Pittsburgh. At Chicago, Mayor Anton Cermak picked up the thread. The Rev. Mat-

thew J. Walsh, former president of Notre Dame, continued from New York, and Will Rogers delivered the final speech from San Antonio, Texas.

Among the many messages received praising Rockne and wishing success to the memorial fund, campaign were telegrams from President Hoover and Gov. Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York. In his message President Hoover said: "In his life and character, Knute Rockne was the embodiment of sound sportsmanship. The proposal to erect a memorial to symbolize his spirit and achievement will strike a responsive cord in the hearts of all Americans. I wish you every success."

In Rochester the Notre Dame Alumni, with Joseph P. Flynn as chairman, held a dinner at the Sagamore and made plans to do their share in the campaign. It is expected the total fund will be raised within a short time.

### Teacher Speaks To C. D. of A. At Brockport

History of business as a career for women together with many luminous and interesting sidelights on this subject was the topic of a talk delivered before Brockport Court of the Catholic Daughters of America in Brockport Monday night, Nov. 9, by Miss Sara R. Malone of Rochester. Miss Malone is director of the secretarial and stenographic departments of the Rochester Business Institute and has been directing instruction of young women for business for the past fifteen years. Fifty members were present to hear her talk.

The speaker gave a detailed account of the progress made by women in business from the time when positions in offices were first opened to women, about forty or fifty years ago. Miss Malone stated that those early pioneers had to battle against prejudice, jealousy and very little compensation to make it easier for the young women of today to earn their livelihood. She told of the kinds of positions that were open to women twenty years ago and compared those with the wonderful opportunities of today. There is no limit to which a woman may not aspire in these times according to Miss Malone who stressed the need for proper and thorough training. The college graduate or even the high school graduate has a background of academic training that will enable her all the more to succeed in business, the speaker explained.

has been to a German University. The Draft of Constitution is the work of such men. Of course there are professors and professors, but as a general rule such men are unfitted for dealing with the realities of political life.

The Future Obscure  
The future is obscure. As I said in one of my first articles, all depends on what forces set the upper hand. In my opinion, when passing calm down a little, will probably give a Cortes less Radical and Anti-Christian than the new one now sitting. Catholics are beginning to wake up to the menace that confronts them. They are beginning to organize. Once the Regional question on which Catholics are divided is settled there will be a better prospect for organized Catholic action. Monarchists also will begin to see that a new Restoration is hopeless. "The milk-white Hind" is not fated to die entirely in Spain. But her enemies, the many and powerful, and the battle will be a long one.

Any person who wishes to see the truth can easily see that, even if he looks at Spain only from the outside and has no knowledge of the interior. He can see that: (1) Out of a total of 446 Deputies, the Socialist compact block numbers 114 (2) that there are only two or three small groups from which a speaker has risen to protest against the anti-religious character of the Draft; (3) that this Draft of Constitution elaborated by representatives from every group in the House is largely anti-religious, the worst in existence except Russia; (4) and that this Assembly has been elected by universal male suffrage in what was supposed to be an overwhelmingly Catholic nation. It is sad, but better for the truth.

Mrs. James Mangan, a member of the Catholic Women's Club and of the Community Theater Players, will play the part of Sister Joanna of the Cross in "The Cradle Song" which is being produced by the Players for the Catholic Women's Club at their Theater in Clinton Avenue South on Monday and Tuesday evenings, November 23rd and 24th. This is the play played by Eva LoCallierne in her production of the drama at the Civic Repertory Theater in New York.

The theme of the play is maternal love, and to develop this theme the authors curiously enough have had their scene in the cloister of a convent. Here in the convent, behind their bars, these women who have stripped themselves bare of riches to come closer to their spiritual ideal, are suddenly confronted with the stupendously rich gift of a little newly born girl, left in a bundle on the "turn" at the entrance. The collective arms of the sisterhood are held out to the little girl. And in the next act, it is from those collective arms that the girl of eighteen must part.

The cast of the play is made up of fifteen characters of which ten play the part of Dominican nuns. The capacity of the theater is limited to five hundred, and the early request for tickets indicates that the house will be sold out for both performances. They are on sale at the Club House, The Columbus Civic Center and at Trapp's.

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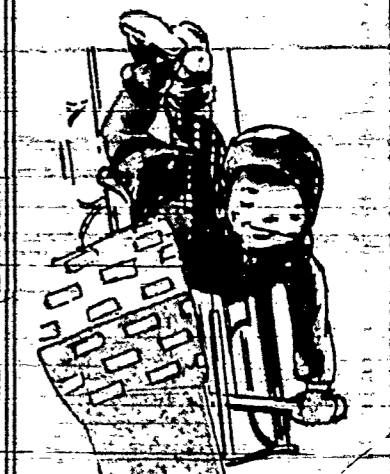
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
