The cartoon and the article were of a blasphemous nature, the work apparently of some student who thought he had discovered a new sense of humor. The magazine was promptly suspended by the college authorities.

President Arthur S. Pease of Amherst College wrote the Rt. Rev. Thomas C. O'Leary, Bishop of Springfield, expressing regret that the of-fensive cartoon and article had been printed. In his letter he said:
"There are many devoted members

of your communion among the fac-ulty, student body and alumni whom no responsible person connected with the college would willingly offend." The undergraduate board of management of the magazine made apology for the cartoon and for the article. In the apology any intention to be blasphemous, disrespectful or ir-reverent was disay owed "The board," the statement said, "has recalled the afore-mentioned issue as far as possible and will do all in its power to make full amends for this mistake.
