William E. Gladstone Wrote Letter to Priest in America, Congratulating Him On His Work

Young Priest at Catholic University Wrote Dissertation on Agnosticism and Religion, and it Pleased Great Statesman

Washington, D. C., Nov. 27.—William Ewart Gladstone, Prime Minister of England during portions of the reign of Queen Victoria, found time in a busy life to read the dissertation presented by a young priest, a student at the Catholic University at Washington, for his degree and to write him a warm letter of approval on the subject of his study, agnosticism.

The Rev. Msgr. George J. Lucas of Scranton, Pa., who died last week, was the first candidate to receive the degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology at Washington. For his degree and to write him a dissertation entitled, "Agnosticism and Religion, being an examination of Spencer's Religion of the Unknown," preceded by a history of agnosticism, which was published in 1895, Gladstone read the dissertation and wrote the author from Bawden Castle, Chester, England, under date of August 4, 1892, as follows:

"I have not a sufficient acquaintance with the general field of philosophy to pronounce an opinion on which you would safely rely as to the value of your work in regard to its historical statements of the very interesting case."

"But I am reading it with warm sympathy and much approval. I am pleased alike with the signs of care which it shows and with the spirit of broad sympathy it exhibits with other defenders of the same great cause who write from a different position."

"I find your argument against Mr. Spencer, so far as I have mastered it very striking. But I ought to add that I regard Agnosticism as one of the worst of all devices in respect to religion, and one of the poorest and shallowest schemes ever broached in regard to philosophy."

I think with you and with the distinguished persons whom you name that it is exactly time for the Christian bodies, unhappily separated in communion, to make common cause as far as they honorably can in this great and all-absorbing question of belief, that forty and profound human interest which as far transcends
