James J. Quigley, aged 57, for the past 10 years district sales manager in Rochester for the Corn Products Refining Company, with offices in the Central Trust Building, died Saturday morning at his home, 41 Berry Street. He came to Rochester from Syracuse, where he held a similar position. His funeral was held Tuesday morning in Corpus Christi Church, and it was attended by many friends.

Mr. Quigley was born in Memphis, Tenn., and in his early life was associated with theatrical enterprises. He was a past president of the Theatrical Mutual Association. He was a member of the Memphis Lodge of Elks, No. 27, Memphis, Conn. He was a knight of Columbus, No. 512; The Monarch Club, Theatrical Mutual Association, the "Turr" Yerein, and the Holy Name Society of Saint Vincent de Paul Church, Syracuse, N. Y.
