

Gandhi Sees Mussolini, But Not the Pope

Previous Engagements Made It Impossible for Pontiff to See Him—Loan Cloth Is Blamed.

Rome, Dec. 18.—Mahatma Gandhi, apostle of liberty for India and of loth clothes for man, came to this ancient city Saturday to see Pope Pius XI and also Premier Mussolini. He saw Mussolini, but not the pontiff. Rumor has it that his loth cloth and shawl were not considered the proper clothing for a Vatican visit. But at the Vatican it was explained that the Pope was extremely busy with previous appointments and could not see Gandhi. But it was learned that the Vatican considered Gandhi's retirement suit perfectly proper and at the same time considered the matter a bit too different. Although Gandhi did not see the Pope, he spent more than an hour at the Vatican, viewing its priceless art treasures.

Rome, Dec. 18.—The Rev. Luis Guizar, pastor of the Chihuahua City Cathedral, Mexico, has been appointed Bishop of Campeche, Mexico. The Rev.
