**Young Vincentian Home,
From Bandit Zone in China,
Had Many Thrilling Escapes**

Rev. Edward Young, C.M., Was Captured Once by Bandits, and Had to Flee Many Times for His Life—Under Machine Gun Fire Once.

The Rev. Edward Young, C.M., for six years past a missionary in the Kiangsi Province, China, under the Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Shea, is home for a lengthy vacation and rest. He stopped in Rochester one night last week to visit his friends, the Father McGuire, C.M., who is at St. Mary's Hospital for a time. The next day he left for his home in Long Island, where he will spend the first Christmas with his mother since 1914. Needless to say, it will be a happy reunion.

Two years ago Father Young was captured by bandits and taken from his mission with them. At that time were not so strong as later on, and they had a great fear of antagonizing the National government. They kept Father Young only a short time. For a while they abused him badly and threatened him, then were kind to him, because they feared the approach of Chinese soldiers. He finally escaped.

For the past year and a half Father Young had experiences that would pile thrill upon thrill in the old-fashioned dime novel. More than a score of times he had to flee to the mountains, sometimes by day, other times by night. Once he fled through the back gate as bandits poured into his mission from the front gate. Once Chinese soldiers surrounded a place where bandits were harboring for him, and they opened fire upon the bandits. Father Young, stooping low, ran along the side of a wall. The soldiers, perhaps thinking he was one of the bandits, turned a machine gun upon him and a storm of bullets flew around him, one hitting him in the shoulder.

Father Young spent many days and nights in the mountains, sleeping under trees. The romance of this ends abruptly when one is told that tigers are numerous and vicious in that part of China. It is poetic, perhaps, to look upwards at the moon and stars when one is going to sleep, but the poetry is gone when one hearing crackling limbs, thinks it may be a tiger approaching.

Father Young is of the opinion that there will be no real war between China and Japan, but that Japan will be the dominant power in Manchuria, if it does not take it over entirely. Conditions are "terribly mixed" for the missionaries there now, he says, and one never knows what will happen or when.
