**Holiday Luncheon Dish**

- 1 box sardines
- 1 lemon
- 1 box mayonnaise
- 1 box watercress

Remove sardines and entrails from a box of sardines. Place on platter and surround with wreath of watercress or parsley. Cut radishes in halves or thirds and arrange in the parsley. Cut lemons in halves crosswise and then cut in deep points. Arrange at side and side of platter in the parsley. Serve very cold.

**Raspberry Parfait**

- 1 package raspberry-jacket
- 1 pint milk
- 1 cup each of dates, figs, nuts and raisins chopped
- 1 cup cream
- 2 whites of eggs
- 1 cup granulated

Put the chopped fruit, nuts, and cream in a bowl. Beat the egg whites stiff. Warm the milk to lukewarm. Not hot. Remove from stove, add junk. Stir for one minute to dissolve. Then stir in quickly the beaten egg whites. Pour it into the parfait dish and serve.

**Lemon Mincemeat**

- 2 lemons
- 1 pound currants
- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 1 cup melted butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1 teaspoon ground allspice

Squeeze juice from lemons and pour into a bowl. Put through a sieve. Add currants and nuts through a sieve. Add chopped apples and remaining ingredients. Mix well and store in jars. Use as a filling for mince pies.

**Poverty Pudding**

- 6 cups whole milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/2 cup nutmeg
- 1/2 cup raisins

**Holiday Sandwiches**

Use colorful and seasonable fillings for your holiday sandwiches. Include sugar wherever possible, for this is a quick-energy food that is needed by your friends and guests during the hurrying rush of the holiday season. Here are two suggestions:

**Date Sandwiches**

- 1 cream cheese
- 1/2 cup dates
- 1/2 cup English walnut meats
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Run the dates and nut meats through the food grinder, using the coarse plate. Mix with the cheese and season with the sugar. Spread on buttered slices of whole wheat bread.

**Cherry Sandwiches**

- 1 cream cheese
- 1 tablespoon cream
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/2 cup cherries fine

Chop the cherries fine. Add them with the cream and sugar to the cheese. Mix thoroughly. Spread on buttered slices with a doughnut cutter, leaving a small hole in the center through which the filling shows.

**Shell-Filled Oysters**

- 25 oysters with liquor
- 2 cups bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup milk and cream
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper

Season oysters with onion salt, pepper and a dash of Worcestershire sauce (if possible). Cover with a thick pie crust, baked dough. Bake in a moderate oven until the crust is cooked, or until browned and heated through. If potato is used.

**Christmas Croquettes**

- 1 cup state cake crumbs
- 1/2 cup chopped, blanched almonds or shredded cocoanut
- 1/2 cup grated rind of lemon
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1 egg yolk
- 1 egg white

Mix first four ingredients in saucepan, add orange juice, to molten, and let stand ten minutes. Heat to boiling point, remove from fire, add egg yolk and cool. Shape as croquettes; dip in egg white, beaten slightly, with one tablespoon cold water; roll in sifted dry bread or cake crumbs, and fry in deep fat. Sprinkle with powdered sugar, and serve with chocolate sauce.

**Pleasant Puddings**

It is almost impossible for a high-minded cook to conceive of a winter dinner without a pudding for dessert. For luncheon puddings and cold weather seem to go perfectly together. There are two simple recipes using coffee as a flavoring which usually call for extra helpings. For each recipe brew the coffee fresh, using two heaping table-spoons to the cup of water.

**Rice Pudding**

- 1/2 cup unpolished rice
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups coffee
- 2 cups milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract or rose extract

Wash the rice and place in a well-oiled pudding dish. Add sugar, salt, extract, coffee and milk, stir thoroughly and set in a slow oven, not more than 200 degrees F. Stir every 20 minutes for three times, then cover and bake gently an hour longer. Serve with sweetened whipped cream, plain cream or caramel sauce.

**Cabinet Pudding**

- 2 cups milk
- 3 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon powdered clove
- 1 cup chopped dates
- 1/2 teaspoon melted butter
- 1/2 cup sugar

Beat the eggs, add sugar and spices and pour in the milk and coffee, which should be heated together; add butter. Thoroughly oil a mould and sprinkle it with the dates, chopped fine, and put in a layer of the mixture over this cover and steam an hour. Serve with a sauce. Stale opening cakes or a mixture of odds and ends of cake may be used.
