

Father Ferger Of Buffalo is Speaker Here

Editor of The Catholic Union and Times Addresses January Meeting of Western New York Publishers

The Rev. Edward J. Ferger, militant editor of The Catholic Union and Times of Buffalo, N. Y., was one of the speakers at the January meeting of the Western New York Publishers Association at the Powers Hotel here Saturday.

"Evils that exist in this country today exist because the American newspapers are afraid to come out and tell the truth," Father Ferger said.

"If you have crime, corruption, immorality, you may find an account of it on the front pages, but you will not find any denunciation of such things in the editorial columns," said Father Ferger.

"The complaint in the United States today is not that journalism is corrupted," he declared, "it is that it is getting back into the boiler plate function of the American press."

The response has been most gratifying as manifested by the study clubs and programs that are being organized in all parts of the United States.

Duffy, pastor of the Church of the Holy Cross, in New York, and a famous World War chaplain, "The Providence Visitor," official newspaper of the Diocese of Providence, has just revealed.

"The Visitor" makes this revelation in connection with a victory dinner held here to mark the conclusion of the most successful year in the athletic history of La Salle Academy, conducted by the Christian Brothers in this city. The most Rev. William A. Hickey, Bishop of Providence, the Rev. Brother A. Raymond, F.S.C., Director of the Academy, Gene Tunney, "Chick" Meahan, athletic director at Manhattan College, New York; Lieut. Gov. James G. Connolly, and Mayor Dunne were among the 1,250 persons attending the celebration.
