New York, Feb. 18.—The Senior class at Manhattan College, which made public recently its composite attitude toward persons and things, found in former Governor Alfred E. Smith "the greatest living American" and favorite presidential candidate. As the most representative American, however, the class chose Charles G. Dawes, while Pope Pius XI was designated the greatest living man.

Application of Social Teaching To Industry, Bridging the Chasm Between Workers and Owners

The Aim Is That Wage Workers Should Pass from Ranks of Propertyless into the Position of Part Owners of the Industries

Washington, D. C., Feb. 9.—An aim, a method, and a means to attain both method and aim give the high lights of the application of Catholic social teaching to American industry.

The aim is that salaried and wage workers pass from the ranks of the propertyless into the position of part owners of industry through living wages, wages that will ensure steady work, wages that will provide an ample sufficiency for savings, and through partnership in management, profits and ownership.

The aim is a country in which the chasm between owners and propertyless is bridged in a harmonious economic order working for the right use of God's gifts, for a wider distribution of income and wealth and for the brotherhood of men in their industrial and occupational and in all economic life.

The method, which is itself in part an aim, is a combination of economic organization and governmental activity. The emphasis is on organization. Every worker is in a labor union. Every employer is in a trade association. They bargain for the betterment of their interests to both.

They, moreover, unite in joint committees not only to bargain and to settle the grievances that arise between them, but to effect industrial cooperation and to plan and guide their whole industry. And all these

Four Priests Named Domestic Prelates by Supreme Pontiff

Monseigneur Schellhorn is also a native of this city, the son of Louis and Mary Schellhorn. He was born Feb. 3, 1872. He was brought up in Holy Family parish, attended St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Joseph's Seminary at Troy, and completed his studies at St. Bernard's Seminary in 1896, being ordained that year by Bishop McQuaid at the Cathedral in May 30. He was assistant to his life-long friend, Father Harahan, at St. Michael's Church until April 27, 1904, when he undertook the founding of the new Parish of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Joseph Avenue. Twenty-eight years of service at Perpetual Help Church show their results in the well trained Catholic people, in a magnificent church building, a school, convent and rectory. Father Schellhorn has been prominent in the Knights of St. John of which his father was a charter member, and is considered a leader among the German Catholics of Rochester. A witness of the honor that has come to Father Schellhorn from the Pope is his mother, who makes her home with him, who is now 89 years old.

Monseigneur Shay was born in Albion, the son of Michael Shay and Margaret Kelly Shay, Aug. 28, 1886. He was brought up in Rochester. He was a pupil of the Cathedral School, of St. Andrew's Seminary and of St. Bernard's Seminary, and was ordained June 8, 1912. He has served as assistant pastor of St. Anne's Church in Hornell, of St. Augustine's Church in Rochester and as pastor of Epiphany Church ofodus. He was made pastor of the Cathedral January 22, 1923, succeeding Bishop O'Hern, who had been transferred to Corpus Christi Church, Monseigneur Shay also served as assistant chancellor of the diocese under Bishop Hickey. Besides his close contact with the people of the Cathedral parish, he has established friendships far and wide through his weekly broadcast over Station WHAM, in which he has given instructions on the doctrines of the Catholic faith. He is secretary of the Diocesan Board of Censors, Father Shay's parents are still living, and are members of his parish.

Three Recent Deaths

Bishop O'Hern called attention to the fact that the diocese has lost within a short time three of its ionseignors through death, the Rt. Rev. James Bloomer, V. P., of Elmira; the Rt. Rev. Michael J. Nolan, chancellor; the Rt. Rev. Andrew B. Meenan, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary. All of the newly named monseignors are officials of the diocese, three of them consultants, and Monseigneur Griffin the Bishop's representative in the Corning district in this capacity as dean. Monseigneur Griffin is the oldest among the officials of the diocese.

The cable received by Bishop O'Hern, announcing the elevation of these priests indicated that the Episcopal bishops have been signed in the office of the papal secretary of state, Department of Briefs, through Magr. Dominico Spada, and are being dispatched to Rochester.

course of his work of installing stacks, and he said he was amazed to find long rows of massive pillars, in lines and in diagonals, which actually were within one-sixteenth of an inch "true," as measured by a steel tape.

Mr. MacDonald described the huge masonry walls, many feet thick, upon which the roof rested, and presented a diagram showing how in the sixteenth century, when iron was a luxury, arches, supported by pillars, set comparatively close to each other, carried ceilings and floors above. Infrequently a iron tie rod was thrust through the arch, he said, to make it more solid, and several of the pictures showed these rods piercing walls of the arched walls, and tending to detract from the beautifully decorated interiors.
