These contain almost nothing but pictures of women partly or wholly nude. A few purport to be pictures of works of art exhibited in distant cities. That does not excuse the seller."

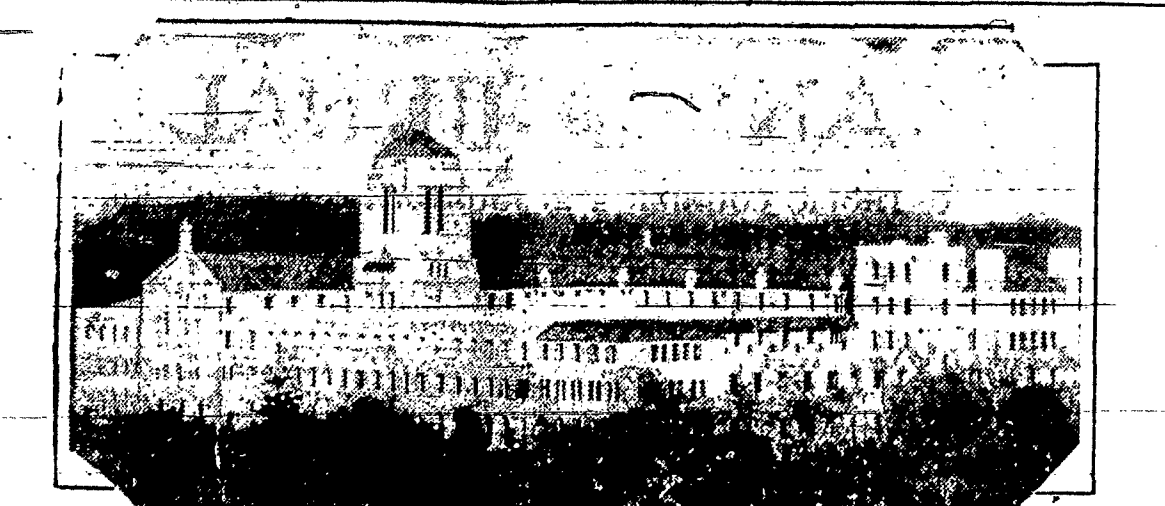

The new motherhouse of the Foreign Mission Sisters of St. Dominic (Maryknoll Sisters), at Maryknoll, N. Y. THE HOLY SACRIFICE OF THE MASS Twenty-third Talk—By the Rev. Charles F. Shay. I. "Mass of the Catechumens" II. "Prayers at the Foot of the Altar" III. "The Eucharistic Sacrifice" The word "Mass" denotes the solemn liturgy of the present at the Divine Service. The formula which indicates this meaning is "Ite, Missa Est"—"Go, it is the dismissal." During the old baptismal and penitential regime a two-fold dismissal was in force at the Sacrifice. The Catechumens and the penitents were permitted to assist along with the faithful at the first portion of the Divine Worship and then formally dismissed after the Gospel of the day. At this time the deacon turned to the laity and bade them to depart, since they were either uninitiated or had departed from the faith. This is the origin of the custom of the dismissal which is required to be present at the celebration of the Mass. The term "Missa," which therefore signifies primarily the dismissal of such persons from further participation in the Mass was transferred to the celebration of the Mass itself. Now this name applied to the entire celebration of the Mass. It is not surprising that the term "Missa" was used to designate the celebration of the Mass in the early centuries. Population of the Vatican City Is a Trifle Less Than One Thousand

Vatican City, April 8.—The census shows that its population has been constantly increasing since the Constitution of the tiny State. Its numbers amount to 1,000, the exact figure being 993. The citizens of Vatican City in the true sense of the word are fewer, numbering only 711. To these however, must be added the resident citizens, who, though enjoying all the rights of citizenship, reside inside the walls of the Vatican and are (temporarily) Italian citizens. The number of citizens of Vatican City is 993. Only 711 are citizens of Vatican City. The others are citizens only by virtue of the fact that they reside in Vatican City or of the positions they occupy in the administration of the Holy See. Apart from 11 born in Vatican City, all the others were originally citizens of some other State. First among the latter naturally is the Pope himself, who holds the list of Italian citizens, followed in alphabetical order by all the rest. Italy supplies by far the largest number of citizens of Vatican City, which are almost all Catholics. The citizens of the Vatican are conducted chiefly in Italian, most of them being of Italian extraction. The total number of Italian citizens of Vatican City who are of Italian extraction now number 565, or more than 50 per cent of the entire population. In numerical order, the next largest group follows in the Swiss with 110. The large number of Swiss is explained by the fact that the entire Swiss Guard is recruited from Switzerland. France and Germany each supply eight citizens. Among the latter are Cardinal Ehrle, the Vatican librarian; two Vatican druggists and four French monks from Alsace. Other citizens who have left the Pope's private residence kitchen. The number of former Spanish citizens has recently been increased by one through the addition of Cardinal Segura, who formerly was the Primate of Spain. Holy supplies two citizens, namely, the United States, Austria, Norway, Czechoslovakia and Poland contribute each only one. The only American by birth who has become a citizen of Vatican City is a Miss Maledini. She is a niece of Mass Maledini, a member of the Public Works Commission of Vatican City. She was born in the United States and was an American citizen before assuming citizenship in Vatican City.

Chauncey Olcott Is Buried From St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York

New York, April 8.—Chauncey Olcott, famous singer and actor of Irish descent, was buried from St. Patrick's Cathedral here Saturday morning. Olcott died several days previously at Monte Carlo, aged 71 years, and his body was brought to New York for interment. He was a native of Buffalo, and made his first appearance in that city at the Academy of Music in 1880 after becoming established as a star. His plays included "Torrance," "Edmund Burke," "O'Connell of Derry," "Reverend Paddy," "The Paddy Whack," "The Heart of O'Brien," "Once Upon a Time" and "The Voice of O'Connell." In November, 1925, while playing on tour in "The Rivals," Mr. Olcott was stricken with a serious illness. He never again appeared on the stage. Persons from all walks of life, most of them in or past middle age, crowded St. Patrick's Cathedral for the funeral. The crowd was so great that many, unheeding of admittance, had to remain outside. The requiem Mass was sung by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Michael J. Lavelle, rector of the Cathedral, and the full Cathedral choir was accompanied by a part of the choir of the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick. The Rev. Patrick Scully of St. Peter's Church, Saratoga, N. Y., of which Olcott formerly was a parishioner, acted as deacon of the Mass, and the subdeacon was the Rev. William Martin of the Holy Family Church, New Rochelle, a friend of Olcott's who was known as Hornellsville.

Wealthy Spaniard Leaves Fortune to Each Of the Children of Former King of Spain

Madrid, April 8.—Marquis Valde-lla, the philanthropist, who died last week, bequeathed 1,000,000 pesetas (\$75,700 at the present rate of exchange) to each of the former children of King Alfonso of Spain—Princess of Asturias, the Infanta, Infante Juan and Gonzalo and the Infantas Maria Cristina and Beatriz. The Infantas had no personal fortune of their own and recently traveled second-class on a trip to Ireland, saying that they could not afford to go first class. The Marquis Valdeilla was one of Spain's wealthiest men, and he was a great philanthropist. For many years he had been a close friend of King Alfonso, and his bequests to the children are believed to have been made because he knew that they were without suitable means of their own.
