A Courageous Dentist An appointment with the dentist is hardly, under the best of circumstances, an event calling for eager anticipation, but in the Orient the experience has features which render it especially formidable. In the paragraphs which follow, Father Robert J. Cairns, Marist missionary of South China, describes a recent visit to an ambitious young Oriental dentist. "It's an unattractive office," this dentist's shop. I had a tooth filled with cement just now at the cost of five silver twenty cent coins—a Chinese dollar—but the job is worth what you pay for it (and only that much). The dentist, who arrived from Canton a month ago, "hung his signs," or rather, had them painted, on the square pillars in front of his rented office. "He is a nice young fellow, but a poor dentist. In China, no diploma is required—little knowledge is necessary, but in place of these, one must have plenty of courage, and enough capital to buy a dental chair, a few tons, and a glass cabinet to show them off. Surgical Kits for Missions Masses of the mission dispensaries and hospitals will find their facilities for caring for the sick greatly increased when they receive one of the splendid Surgical Kits now being ordered by the Catholic Medical Mission Board. It is hoped to secure about twenty-five of them, though of course a far greater number could be used if means were available to buy them. As some dispensaries have complained that they are so destitute as to have to use sterilized penknives for smaller operations, it will be seen how great a help these Surgical Kits will be to the missions.
