CARDINAL O'CONNELL'S RADIO ADDRESS FROM DUBLIN ON CATHOLIC HOUR

Cardinal O'Connell of Boston who was heard Sunday over the National Broadcasting Company's network in the weekly Catholic Radio Hour sponsored by the National Council of Catholic Men from the Eucharistic Congress, Dublin, Ireland, spoke of the great public demonstration of faith occurring in Ireland during the Congress and said that it demonstrated in a most notable way the catholicity of the Church of Christ.

The text of his address as it appeared in the New York Times was as follows:
"It gives me the greatest happiness to speak to all my friends in America from Dublin, Ireland.
"The thirty-first Eucharistic Congress, which was held in Dublin, Ireland, has now completed its work. It was the most glorious event. From the lovely lakes and dales, and the picturesque hills and mountain sides of the Emerald Isle, we gathered to the Eucharistic Congress to give public demonstration of the faith planted in Ireland by the great apostle, St. Patrick, and nurtured through all the centuries by his devoted and loyal successors.
"To this congress came the highest representatives of church and State, devout Christians from all over the world, inspired by the same faith in Christ the King, and by the same devotion of the real presence of Christ in the sacrament of his love.
"The hundreds of thousands kneeling with hands bowed as the Sacred Host was raised in benediction above them was a scene never to be forgotten by those who beheld it. The very atmosphere was charged with a sentiment so mystic, so penetrating, that one instinctively felt the spiritual thrill which the soul experiences in the presence of its Lord and God.
"The thought and the sentiment and the faith and the devotion was the same in the hearts and in the consciences of all these representatives of the various nations and races that inhabit this broad earth, here assembled in one hope, one faith, one love. Here, too, was demonstrated in a most notable way the catholicity of the Church of Christ.
"For the moment all the difficulties and the dangers with which the world is at present beset have vanished. The weaknesses of human government, the follies of human passion the world over were utterly forgotten, and there was an outpouring of human aspirations for the blessings that can come from God alone.
"There was something about the hundreds of thousands assembled around the altar that convinced you that truly God was in the midst of His people.
"In this tremendous mystery is all the omnipotence of the power which created the universe. The infinite love of God for humanity as shown in the incarnation of His only Son, Christ Jesus, the Son of God, who came down upon earth that He might bring us back by His love to our Eternal Father, God himself, because of His love for the human race. The Son of God was not merely willing, but He was desirous to be the food of our souls by His presence in the blessed sacrament.
"Left Perpetual Memorial
"During His short time on earth He left us a perpetual memorial of His love by His greatest testament. To His apostles assembled about Him in that hour of death, Christ said, as He held in His hands the bread that He was to give them for their sanctification, 'This is My body.' Then as He took the chalice of wine and breathed upon it, again He spoke, saying, 'This is My blood,' and ordained them His priests forever, according to the order of Melchizedek, and He commanded them, 'Do this in commemoration of Me,' and from that day to this the loyal priesthood of Christ has repeated these sacred words, which were the breath of a new life in the church, established by Him.
"It was His infinite love that found the way, and His infinite power that furnished the means whereby the eternal Son of God might always be wherever there was a human soul to be saved.
"We believe, with a faith that nothing can shake, the words spoken by Christ in that most solemn hour of His life on earth, when Jesus said, 'This is My body; this is My blood,' the apostles accepted His words as the words of God Himself, and we, like them, bow down before the great sacrament of divine love and adore Him as really, as truly, as genuinely present as He was to all who beheld Him during His mortal

Father Dougherty was educated in the Cathedral Immaculate Conception schools of Rochester and made his studies for the priesthood at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries. After his ordination June 10, 1922, he served as assistant pastor of St. Monica's Church for three years, leaving there to become chaplain at Sonoma. He has begun his new duties.
The new Catholic chaplain at Craig Colony, Sonoma, will be the Rev. J. Edmund O'Brien, assistant pastor of St. Mary's Church in Rochester. Father O'Brien began his new work Monday, taking charge of the Chapel of the Divine Compassion. He was born in Elmira Jan. 10, 1896, son of Daniel O'Brien and Ann Ford O'Brien. He studied in the Elmira schools and at St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries, and was ordained June 10, 1922. He has served at St. Mary's Church in Auburn and Blessed Sacrament and St. Mary's churches in Rochester.
The Rev. James J. Haughey has been transferred from his place as assistant pastor of the Church of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin at Brockport to the post of assistant pastor of St. Alphonse Church in Auburn.
