Moravia—Fifty dollars was realized by women of St. Patrick's Church by a lawn fete conducted last Saturday evening on the rectory grounds.

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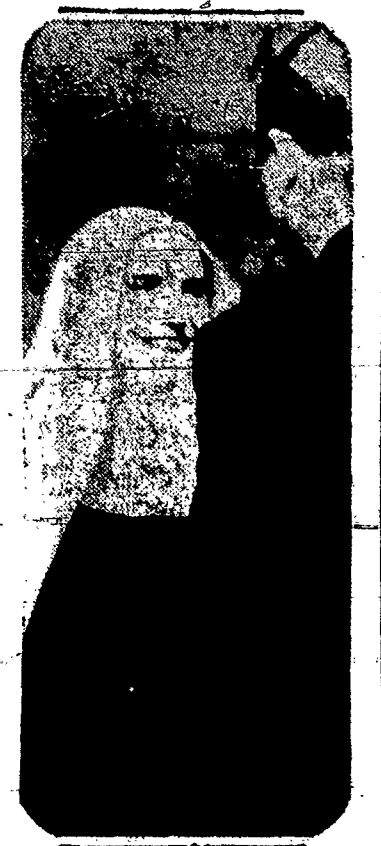
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Actress Takes Veil

The diocese of Salt Lake, which originally comprised all of Utah and seven counties of Nevada, was established as a Vicariate Apostolic on Nov. 23, 1886, and was erected diocese on Jan. 27, 1891.

The official Catholic Directory for the current year gives the following statistics for the diocese: Priests, diocesan, 21; Religious, total 22; ecclesiastical students, 19; Religious women, 123; churches with resident priests, 15; missions with churches, 3; total churches, 18; chapels in institutions, 9; college for young ladies, 1; students, 54; academies, 2; boys, 20; girls, 242; total pupils in academies, 262; parochial high schools, 2; boys, 84; girls, 59; total high schools, 140; parochial schools, 7; boys, 415; girls, 356; total parochial school pupils, 771.

There is in the diocese one orphan asylum, in charge of the Sisters of the Holy Cross, caring for 34 orphans, and one hospital, also in charge of Sisters of the Holy Cross, which cared for 542 patients last year.

Fr. Haas Gives "Planks" for Aid To Unemployed

Director of Catholic Social Service School Makes Recommendations at Philadelphia Meeting

Philadelphia—"Planks" in a program for meeting the present unemployment situation were submitted by the Rev. Dr. Francis J. Haas, director of the National Catholic School of Social Service, in an address which he delivered at the Forum Meeting of the National Conference of Social Work, just held here.

"The depression will go on until we stop swallowing slogans. The public official who uses catchwords to fool the public is a public enemy. What we need is plain thinking and plain talking.

"Too long we have put up with the dishonest expressions, 'no dole,' 'balance the budget,' and 'don't ask the rich.'"

"Why use the word 'dole' as if it were poison? Why 'Federal relief' and 'local relief' not a 'dole'?"

"We are in a great emergency and must use emergency measures. When one or more of its members are critically sick a family does not think of expenses. It does not fret about 'balancing its budget.' It borrows."

"The Federal Government must do the same thing. At least a five billion dollar bond issue is imperative. Part of it should be used to feed the starving millions, part of it for public works."

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"Each year we graduate tens of thousands of young people from our Catholic schools, thousands of them with degrees. Yet Catholic editors are constantly complaining of the dearth of Catholic writers in the country."

"We have in this country reviews and magazines in which Catholic writers compare in scholarship with those in the secular field, yet none has a circulation equal to that of the number of graduates of Catholic colleges for the past four years."

"A Catholic can hardly pretend to be well informed about things Catholic if he does not read a Catholic newspaper regularly, yet those familiar with Catholic college alumni know that those who rarely or never see a Catholic newspaper greatly outnumber those on such subscription list."

"This is an indictment to the Catholic colleges and to the Catholic educators making such strenuous and magnificent efforts to provide the Church and State with an intelligent, informed laity. They deserve a better return on their investment of self-sacrificing labor."

"The Catholic press needs writers, men and women able to put Catholic teaching not merely into grammatical English but with the facility of expressing it in lucid, sparkling, attractive style. There are plenty of our college men and women with this ability; there are too few of them using it for the Catholic or for any other press. Catholic schools and colleges are striving to direct these talents into effective channels. For that we are grateful. We ask that they continue and increase such fine efforts."

"The Church needs intellectual laymen and women, and if it is not able to look to its school and college graduates, to whom must it turn? A high school or college education, in itself, is in other fields, is merely beginning; it must be continually developed. It can be developed only by reading and study, and the chief basis of such reading and study is the Catholic Press."

"Service Can Be Rendered Here the Catholic school and college can render a great service by introducing the Catholic press to their students—the magazines and reviews for literature and the Catholic newspapers for current events, bringing into the home not only a livelier knowledge of the truths of faith but a keener sympathy for the religion and the persons and the organizations and the activities which constitute the living Church on earth. We appreciate what they are doing in this direction, for the young people in our schools are the hope of the Catholic press of America, and by bringing Catholic publica-

Catholic Colleges, South India, Give Religious Exams

Mangalore (South India)—With the purpose of securing a greater attention to the teaching and study of Religion in the Catholic Colleges of South India, the Catholic Educational Council of the Madras Presidency inaugurated four years ago a project of Inter-Collegiate Examination in Religion, touching especially the subjects of Apologetics and Christian Doctrine. The experiment has proved a great success. Eight out of 11 Colleges of South India this year sent up 617 candidates. At the first examination, four years ago, only 137 candidates participated.

The Board of Examiners to which is entrusted the valuation of the papers testifies to an ever-increasing interest evinced by the University Students in the study of Religion. The President of the Board is the Rev. Father Ambrose, S.J., Rector of Saint Aloysius College, Mangalore, author of a learned and widely diffused commentary on the Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius.

Each year the Bishops of the United States set aside the month of February as Catholic Press Month. Ten years of regular agricultural broadcasts will be celebrated over National Broadcasting Company Network Monday, July 18, when the daily National Farm and Home Hour is presented by Station KDKA, Pittsburgh, pioneer in the field.

The special program, which will be carried over WHAM and an NBC network at 12:30 during the regular Farm and Home Hour period, will depict the development of the farm broadcast from its beginning in 1922 to the present time.

Light concert music and the voices of Rae Foster Roberts will be heard during the broadcast. The program will be broadcast from the studios of WHAM, Rochester, under Charles Silverman's direction at 10:11 P. M.

The program to be sent to the NBC-WJZ network included two selections from the incidental music to the drama, "The Great Divide" by David Guion, Gregory Love, William Frank Lahar and Chamundam "Silver Ring" and Ketalby's "In a Mortuary Garden."

Opening ceremonies of the British Imperial Economic Conference in Ottawa, Canada, on Thursday, July 21, will be carried throughout the United States over a National Broadcasting Company network.
