None would have guessed that this home had just been visited by the cruel destroyer death in one of its most hideous guises, public execution. Here there was the hurried, hurried preparation, the warmth, and the cheer of the wedding feast, naturally enough in the hearts of the guests who came to the banquet upon which Mrs. Brody lavished her means. She was an unanswered question which she herself must answer.

At last all were about the table loaded down with the choicest viands. They looked expectantly towards their hostess who stood at one end, tall, slender, gracious. A hushed silence descended upon the room. "You may think it strange for a mother," Mrs. Brody explained, "to rejoice thus at the death of her son. You may wonder that such a feast has been prepared here, that precious boon which God in His mercy granted him in that death, my friends, I see the marriage of his soul, eternally and happily wedded to Christ. Eat, my friends, and be merry. Be happy as I am and as my son. He and I have much to be thankful for."

She paused and then went on: "He was a Catholic and died because of that glorious faith. I, too, am a Catholic and rejoice because of my beloved son's happy death, that precious boon which God in His mercy granted him in that death, my friends, I see the marriage of his soul, eternally and happily wedded to Christ. Eat, my friends, and be merry. Be happy as I am and as my son. He and I have much to be thankful for."

The venerable John Brody, the central figure in this unusual episode, was born at Wells in Somerset in 1849, studied at Winchester and New College, Oxford, of which he became a fellow in 1868. In June, 1876, he, with seven other fellows, was deprived of his position by Home, the Protestant Bishop of Winchester. But the following year found him at Douai college in France, studying civil law. He returned to England in February, 1878. Do not throw away the waxed paper in which the bread comes. Keep it in a handy place and use it for cleaning your stove. Rub the paper over the stove while it is still warm and it will remove all soil and grease.

A double boiler is splendid for warming biscuits, rolls and muffins, especially those a trifle dried out.

New York.—The annual reunion of the Knights of Columbus World War Secretaries will be held in Washington, D. C., on August 14. Nearly 1,000 members and their families have made application for reservations.

Kenny, chairman, has announced that arrangements have been made with the War Department for the erection of a large tent near the Washington Monument, where the banquet will take place on Sunday evening. It is expected that the delegates will arrive in the city on Monday, August 14, and the banquet will be held immediately following the dedication of the Cardinal Gibbons Monument and the annual convention of the Knights of Columbus will open the following morning.

Lauds Catholic Women for Work

Hartford, Conn.—The strong arm of the Church in Connecticut, the words used by the Most Rev. Maurice F. McAuliffe, Auxiliary Bishop of Hartford, to describe the Connecticut Council of Catholic Women at the Council's annual conference just held at Lakeville Manor. Bishop McAuliffe praised highly the work of the council in its program of Catholic Action, and pointed out the necessity for the people to take part in the work of the Church, to join with the Hierarchy in the defense of Christian and Catholic principles, and not simply to remain "in the pews." "The Mystical Body of Christ" as translated from the French by the Rev. Dr. John J. Burke, C.S.P., General Secretary of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, brings out this thought very clearly, Bishop McAuliffe said.

Jerusalem Water Supply Low. Jerusalem.—The water supply problem in Jerusalem is growing worse daily. Residents of the city are threatening to withhold payment of taxes unless they are assured of an adequate supply. Two proposals by engineering firms to bring water from the River Auja, at a cost estimated in the neighborhood of \$500,000, have been rejected by the Government.
