Catholic World Over

Patrick Ambrose, Jr., a sophomore at Loyola College, Montreal, a Catholic student, was awarded second place in the National Literary Awards of America, sponsored by outstanding publications in Canada and the United States.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Thomas H. McLaughlin, president of Seton Hall College, South Orange, N. J., and rector of the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception, Darlington, was granted an audience with the Holy Father on July 5 according to an Associated Press despatch.

The formal possession of the Thomas Baptist Anglo-Vernacular School belonging to the Bombay East Indian Association was recently turned over by the Secretary of the Association to the archdiocese of Bombay, India, which will now be in charge of the school.

Announcement has been made in New York that the tenth biennial convention of the International Federation of Catholic Alumnae will be held from August 27 to September 1 at Denver.

In a recent audience with the Holy Father, His Excellency Viscount de Fontenay, French ambassador to the Holy See, presented to His Holiness a colossal sculpture, ten feet high and weighing almost two tons, representing the martyrdom of the first Vincentian missionary, who was murdered at Fort Dauphin, Madagascar.

More than 2,000 applications have been received from young men who are anxious to train themselves in aviation, radio and television at the Holy Name Technical School, Chicago, the Most Rev. Bernard J. Shell, Auxiliary Bishop of Chicago and director of the school, recently announced. The Holy Name Technical School has been established through donations of Holy Name men and Holy Name branches for the vocational training of underprivileged boys. Candidates are being selected by a committee appointed by Bishop Shell.

A bill providing for the erection of a suitable marker or tablet to commemorate the heroic services rendered during the Revolutionary War by Brigadier General Casimir Pulaski, great Polish Catholic patriot, to the American Colonies, has been re-

ported favorably in the House of Representatives. Meals have been served to 58,423 needy persons since November 23, by the West Side Free Kitchen operated under the direction of Holy Cross Parish, Delray, Michigan, according to a report recently made public. The meals are prepared by the members of the Third Order of St. Francis and women's organizations of the parish.

Word has been received at Cleveland from Rome that the Pontifical Bible Institute has conferred the degree of Doctor of Sacred Scripture upon the Rev. William L. Newton, a professor at Our Lady of the Lake Seminary in the Ohio city.

Twenty-eight vacation schools will be conducted this summer under the auspices of the Milwaukee Archdiocesan Council of Catholic Women in cooperation with pastors and six orders of nuns.
