President Will Accept K. C. Statue

President Hoover Will Attend Unveiling of Cardinal Gibbons' Statue and Will Review Parade

Washington.—President Hoover will attend the unveiling of the memorial statue of the late James Cardinal Gibbons and will accept personally the gift of the monument on behalf of the people of the United States on Sunday, August 14, it has just been announced by D. J. Gallahan, supreme treasurer of the Knights of Columbus.

More than 20,000 Knights of Columbus will parade up Nineteenth Street immediately preceding the unveiling of the statue, gift of the K. of C. to the United States Government.

President Hoover will review the parade, which will be in charge of Colonel John J. Phelan, General Paul B. Malone, Commandant of the 3rd Corps Area, will be grand marshal of the parade.

Many on Reviewing Stand
Others on the reviewing stand will include Governor Albert C. Ritchie of Maryland, church dignitaries, cabinet officers, members of Congress and supreme officers of the Knights of Columbus.

The invitation to the President to attend the ceremony, extended by Supreme Knight Martin H. Carmody, was accepted at the White House.

The unveiling will precede the formal opening of the golden jubilee convention of the Knights of Columbus.

Perhaps the most spectacular feature of the K. of C. convention will be the parade to be participated in by representatives of the Order from every State in the Union. It was announced.
