**Monsignor Seipel's Visit to United States  
At Time of Eucharistic Congress Is Recalled**

(C. V. Service)

During his brief sojourn in the United States in 1926, at the time of the Eucharistic Congress at Chicago, Monsignor Seipel, for a number of years, Chancellor of Austria, also visited the tombs of our greatest Presidents, Washington and Lincoln. To the one he journeyed on his own accord, to the other on invitation of the Catholic Central Verein of America which had arranged a Conference on Ideals of Peace, held at Springfield on June 26. The program included a gathering at the Lincoln Tomb and a tribute of wreaths, deposited at the sarcophagus of the noble President, by their Eminences, Cardinal Puff of Vienna, Cardinal Faulhaber of Munich, and Monsignor Seipel. What the late Austrian priest and statesman said on this occasion is now, that has passed away, worth recalling as characteristic of the man.

"Americans," he declared, "when I look at the tomb of the noble President, a few days ago my first journey took me to the Potomac, to the home and the tomb of the great George Washington. I now stand before the tomb of another great man and I have placed a wreath on the sarcophagus of Abraham Lincoln as a token of veneration for the greatest American, besides Washington, whose memory not only lives in your hearts but is held in esteem among all peoples the world over.

"How full of benediction seems Mount Vernon, how elevating the sight of this monument intended by the American people to honor their great President! But how much more any monument speaks the love which every American cherishes in his heart for those who assured and preserved liberty. And I am happy to observe that you also, Americans of German blood, sharing this veneration, have come here with us, to pay a tribute to your hero.

"In Chicago (at the Eucharistic Congress) we were united by the love of God, and we Europeans were marveling witnesses of the living Faith of a people; and all of us were filled at what we saw of the love of sacrifice and the spirit manifest by itself publicly, both in the observance of religion and the conduct of the people. After our return to our homes we shall proclaim every where the truths of the faith which materialism alone rules in America, that ideals find no place beside it.

The great Congress, which so brilliantly professed so many principles regarding your nation entertained in other countries, and which proved the fullness of religious ideals, has just come to an end, and now we stand on ground hallowed by the sentiments of the people and turn to the second great ideal, that of country.

"Remain true to these ideals, O God to God the things that are God's and to your country the things that are your country's!

A few hours later, at the Peace Conference conducted under the auspices of the Central Verein, the first Catholic demonstration of its kind in the United States, Monsignor Seipel declared it to be his belief that the true significance of the World War in the plan of Providence was contained in the thought: 'we must labor all the more earnestly for peace, because such was the conviction of the noble Washington and Lincoln, he was a man of peace. And like them he loved his country with a slow and patient patriotism, which caused him to regard every sacrifice to country a duty.'
