some time enjoy the same source that they do of sweetest joys.

Of the Saints of heaven—some Apostles and Martyrs are especially mentioned. There are fifteen in all—eight male and seven female—Saints who underwent the violent death of martyrdom. St. John the Baptist heads the list. He needs no introduction to Christians of this generation. St. Stephen leads the brilliant host of Christian martyrs. He was the first to shed his blood for the faith in the New Law. St. Matthias who took the place of the traitor Judas, was beheaded in the first century as a testimony of his belief in Christ and Christ Crucified. St. Barnabas is regarded by many as an assistant and companion to the Apostles and like unto St. Paul was crowned with martyrdom between the years of 53 and 76. St. Ignatius of Antioch went to his death under the Emperor Trajan. He was dragged in chains to the Colosseum and on December 20th, 107, exposed to the wild beasts. St. Alexander I was the fifth Pope after St. Peter. On May 3rd, 115, he was beheaded outside of Rome on the Nomentan Way. St. Marcellinus, a priest, and St. Peter, an exorcist who had something to do with the conversion and baptism of Artemius under St. Peter, were both led outside the walls of Rome and there obliged to bow their heads under the sword. The two youthful heroes, Felicitas and Perpetua, suffered a horrible death in the amphitheatre of Carthage, Africa, in the year 202. St. Agatha of Sicily, holy virgin of noble birth, underwent excruciating tortures that she might send forth her spirit in the peace of the Lord. St. Lucy suffered martyrdom about the year 304 in the great persecution of Diocletian against the Christians. She came of noble lineage, her place of nativity was Syracuse, Sicily. St. Agnes, a child of distinguished parents, though but a child underwent the sword of the executioner in the year 304. St. Cecilia, the Patroness of Music, dedicated her life to God early and when she refused the advances of a distinguished nobleman, Valerian, she was not long ere her head rolled in the dust of earth. St. Anastasia, a holy widow and Martyr, suffered death on Christmas Day in the year 304 under the Emperor Diocletian.

These Saints, with all the rest of the Saints in heaven above, we poor sinners, ask that we may be eternally united with them in heaven. We petition their assistance and ask that through their assistance and ask that they may give us the grace to labor on through the remaining days of our lives; and no matter what the cross or trial that like these Apostles and Martyrs that, if need be, we may suffer and die for Christ and with them also be glorified.

This foregoing prayer concludes with the usual formula: "Through Christ our Lord," but no Amen follows which intimates the close connection between the Canon and the prayers which conclude the Eucharistic Sacrifice.

May I acquaint you with the concluding prayer of the Canon? It runs as follows: "By whom, O Lord, Thou dost always create, sanctify, vivify, bless and bestow upon us all these good things: Through Him, and with Him, and in Him is unto Thee, God

**AFGHANISTAN, MOHAMED'S LAST STRONGHOLD**  
By Rev. George J. Blatter

(Editor's Note: This highly interesting report of Father Blatter's sojourn as first residing priest in Afghanistan is being reprinted serially with permission from The Medical Missionary, publication of the Society of Catholic Medical Missionaries, Inc.)

(Continued from Last Week)

Through the kindness of Mr. Machonacke I found passage on the British legation lorry on its trip to Peshawar. The morning was bitterly cold, but by the time we had overcome the two mountain passes, the noon and afternoon sun shed a friendly warmth. We passed the moonlit night in a caravanary not far from Jelalabad. A bevy of Moslem kept up the unearthly singing of rather howling in discordant and over-varying chorus, in honor of Allah to repel the invading gins or demons. It was nothing new after listening to it so many nights in old Kabul. At three in the morning we passed Jelalabad; at nine we crossed the border and climbed the Khyber pass, arriving at the parish residence a little after ten in the forenoon. It was a reward passage, no doubt, so arranged by the friends who had procured for me a place on the legation lorry.

For some time I continued taking medicine and after apparent recovery I sought to return to Kabul. However, all efforts to obtain a pass during the winter and spring proved vain. All this time I was a confidant of Father Joseph Devlin, paying him a proper compensation. With him and Father Donohoe I made a summer excursion from Rawalpindi and Murree into the delightful Kashmir, stopping with Father de Ruyter, who is maintaining a school of colleges in Baranulla near Srinagar on the Jhelum river. For two weeks I said Mass at Gurmukh, the out-station of Father Stewart of Srinagar. Once more I returned to Peshawar in a vain attempt to get a pass of Kabul. Finally I left Bangalore, two thousand miles south, where I gave a report of my stay in Kabul to the Apostolic Delegate and deposited with him a sum of money for the first priest that should be my successor as resident in Afghanistan. During my sojourn of one year in Rome and half a year in France and many seeking the Afghan visa I had been a continued communication with the Propaganda Office in regard to this enterprise and I had obtained all the extra faculties from the Congregation Sacramentorum. On my last day in Kabul, I called a short notice to the Papal Secretary Cardinal Gasparri, reporting my protracted residence in Afghanistan and its cutting short because of dangerous illness. His Excellency, Most Reverend the Apostolic Delegate of India, had been notified from Rome to take up this matter, and consequently I had received several letters from the delegation. The secretary awaited me at the station and provided quarters for me during a few days stay at Bangalore. His Excellency was pleased to receive my report—and the sum of money I offered for one year's maintenance of the priest who was to succeed me as resident in Kabul. It had already been arranged to follow up this Kabul enterprise by sending a priest as soon as possible, perhaps from Karachi, which was in prospect of being erected into a diocese including Sindh, Baluchistan and Afghanistan as territory.

As several months of my leave of absence from Chicago still remained, I visited Madras, and crossing the Indian Ocean, the Malayan Peninsula, nearly two thousand miles to Singapore, and thence to Sumatra and Java in Oceania. As I had only British money and the banks for a time would not exchange it, when the sterling slumped, I had to cut short my travels. I returned by way of Colombo and back by another way of Karachi not so far from Old Kabul, I had already travelled, by air from Palembang in Sumatra to Batavia in Java, and now decided to take the Imperial Airways from Karachi, India, to Italy. But this trip over the vast desert stretches of Baluchistan, Persia, Iraq, Arabia, Grecian Islands, Athens, and over the
