## Alfred E. Smith Becomes Editor Of Outlook Magazine

New York—Alfred E. Smith has become editor-in-chief of the Outlook magazine, taking the chair once occupied by Theodore Roosevelt.

The magazine, printing of which was suspended last spring, will resume publication in October under the name of The New Outlook. It will be "the voice of the people of America," reflecting the new viewpoint and philosophy that has grown out of the grim depression years, former Governor Smith said.

The 90,000 persons who were subscribers to the Outlook when it suspended publication in May automatically will become the nucleus of its new readers. Frank A. Tichenor, publisher, who conceived of the possibilities of a great national magazine edited by Al Smith and who bought the Outlook, it is reported, for \$12,500 this summer, predicted that Smith's direction and his own will lift its circulation to 500,000.

"If you will not sacrifice we must punish you," said the chief priest, and this once more shall our gods, satisfied of our devotion to them, speak to us."

While the priests consulted with each other as to the method of executing the Bishop, there was silence in the temple.

"We have decreed," at length said the spokesman for the temple priests, "that you be tied by the feet to a bull which shall be driven through the town."

The Bishop was immediately hustled outside the temple area. There a fierce black bull, with murder in his glittering, blood-shot eyes, was being held in check by a number of the temple attendants.

Saturninus was stripped of his garments, his hands tied again, and then his feet which last were attached by another rope to the bull. Then the bull, switched and goaded by his keepers until he was driven frantically, started off down the street dragging the Bishop after him.

With yells and denunciations, the crowd surged after the bull. When it would stop for a moment's rest, panting and almost exhausted, the people hurled mud and stones to infuriate it further. Finally the rope which held the Bishop to the animal broke, and thus released from his burden, the bull thundered off. A priest walked up to the body which, covered with the mud and filth of the street, lay inert and bloodstained upon the pavement. He kicked it with his foot. A crooked smile curled his lips as he turned to his followers.

"Now surely the gods are satisfied. He is dead."

And they left the body remain there.

As soon as the pagan priests had departed from the scene of the outrage, two pious Christian ladies gathered up the Bishop's remains and buried them in a deep ditch so that they might not be profaned. The Bishop's successors, SS. Hilary and Exuperius, gave the martyr more honorable burial, erecting a church at the spot where the body had stopped. This church still exists and is called the church of the Taur (the bull). The body of the saint was transferred at an early date and is still preserved in the Church of St. Sernin, one of the most ancient in southern France. His feast is observed on November 23.
