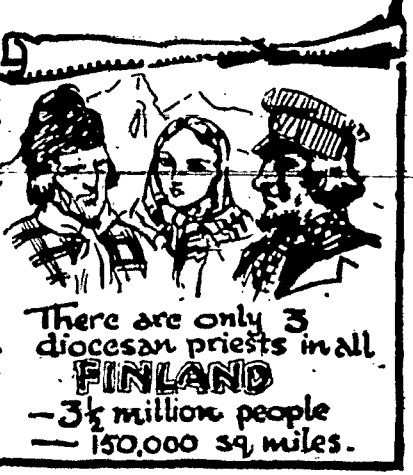

Religious Orders in Spain

In a recent issue of the New York Times, William F. Montavon, K.S.G., L.L.D., director of the N. C. W. C. Legal Department, writes on the religious orders in Spain, answering a letter of Juan Oris Gonzalez, also in the New York Times, the latter's letter making misleading statements regarding facts of public record, according to Mr. Montavon.

"The excess of women is accounted for by the fact that in the total population of Spain women outnumber men. These figures are confirmed by 'Estadística de las Comunidades Religiosas,' published by the Director General de Estadística of the National Labor Department.

"I am able to find nothing in the debates of the Cortes to justify the reference of Mr. Gonzalez to the alleged Protestantism of some of its members. Mr. Gonzalez states that there are in Spain 400 Protestant congregations with 200,000 members. These figures are probably no more accurate than those given for the religious orders in Valencia. Even if accurate, taking into account the fact that the total population of Spain is more than thirty millions.

Spiritual Thoughts

The sight is the most dangerous of all the senses, because it produces more than any of the others. What is created more wicked than the eyes? The wounds inflicted upon the soul by unguarded glances begin to fester many years after they are received, the representations of the most robust temptations. We have an example of this in the life of St. Benedict. Idle thoughts, distractions, rash judgments had destroyed the fruits of a curious and unguarded eye.

"All the passions depend entirely on the imagination and the greater number of the images that this faculty presents to the mind are the objects of the senses of sight. We must therefore conclude that nearly all the passions owe their origin to the eyes. These are the words of the learned Scaranelli.

"Even though the liberty you give your eyes did not lead inevitably to the ruin of your perfection, which I hold impossible, it still remains true that freedom of your eyes will deprive you of that recollection which is absolutely necessary for prayer. He who wishes to see everything, to look at everything, to examine everything can never be a man of prayer. As soon as he would recollect himself to pray, the imagination reproduces all that he has seen. It even embellishes things, delight is found in them, and the distracted mind cannot enlighten the will in order to raise itself to God. If prayer is sometimes difficult for those habitually recollecting, how can those, who through curiosity supply their imagination with every kind of food, expect their prayer to be anything but a long series of distractions?

Modesty of the eyes is necessary not only for our own good but also for the edification of others. God alone sees our heart, men see only our exterior actions and are either scandalized or edified by them. St. Ambrose says that the modesty of virtuous persons is a warning that inclines the worldly to correct themselves. All the saints were apostles and knew that the apostolate of example is no less efficacious than that of the word. They are models, we ought to force ourselves to imitate them and to follow the principle of St. Ambrose. 'Conduct yourself in such a way that you have only to show yourself in order to do good to others.'

Cardinal Van Rossum has deprived the missions of the services of the Prefect of the S. Congregation of Propaganda Fide. H. E. William Cardinal Van Rossum. His well filled career ended with a missionary setting, on his return from the first National Eucharistic Congress of Scandinavia, between his consecrating a missionary bishop for China and his engagement to consecrate a Vicar Apostolic for Norway.

Little known outside of scholastic circles in Rome until his appointment to head the Foreign Missions department of the Holy See, the Cardinal soon made himself felt as a magnetic and powerful leader. The World War had worked havoc in many mission fields by the withdrawal of personnel for military service, the exile of missionaries for nationalistic reasons, the crippling of material resources, etc. A renaissance of missionary activities was needed and Cardinal Van Rossum became the instrument of Divine Providence to reinvigorate the age old missionary traditions of the Church and to extend by leaps and bounds the boundaries of Christ's Kingdom on earth. Numerous orders and congregations were called on for a more efficient occupation of the mission field, a marked impetus was given to the recruiting and training of a native clergy in mission lands, while important sectors were entrusted to native bishops in India, China, Japan and North Africa, stronger unity was obtained within mission areas by the establishment of apostolic delegations, the entire Catholic body was roused to co-operation with the missionary apostolate of the Church by the official character given to the Society for the Fraternity of the Association of the Holy Childhood and the Work of St. Peter Apostle. Of the late Cardinal Van Rossum it may be said that the Popes of "Reform Ecclesiae" and "Maximum Illud" found in him a co-operator singularly gifted in heart and mind to carry out their forward missionary policies.

In our country his passing is mourned by the half-million members of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade, whose work he had deeply at heart and whose Cardinal Protector he had been since 1925.—Catholic Mission News.

The Framingham Quota. Among our (Maryknoll) young Sisters ordained by Bishop Dunn on June 5 are three from Framingham, Massachusetts: the Rev. Arthur J. Cunnane, the Rev. Thomas P. Gillerman, and the Rev. Joseph P. Lavin. In addition to these three missionaries, Framingham is represented at Maryknoll by two other priests, a seminarian, and five Sisters.

How did it come to pass that this relatively small town near the "Hub of the Universe" has such a heavy quota in the Church's American Foreign Legion? Foreign mission vocations have been so numerous at Framingham owing, under God, to the intense interest in Maryknoll of the Rev. Thomas C. Garrahan, pastor of Sacred Heart Church, East Boston, for many years curate at St. Stephen's Church in Framingham. And they that instruct many to justice shall shine as stars for all eternity (Daniel, 12, 3).—The Field Afar.
