Study and Ultimate Formation Of Maternity Guilds Is Urged

The National Catholic Women's Union, which recently held its annual convention in St. Louis jointly with the Catholic Central Verein of America, bids fair to pioneer in what should become a most helpful social and charitable institution, the Maternity Guild.

Suggested and outlined as to purpose and method by the Rev. Jas. J. Schagmann, C. S. R., in the "Bulletin" of the Union earlier in the year, the contemplated guild is intended to provide hospitalization, or proper medical care in the home, for mothers of moderate means and those of the poor, about to be confined.

Designed to ease worries, these and other considerations pertaining to the Maternity Guild were pointed out at the convention by the President, Mrs. S. C. Weaver, in the message submitted to the delegates, and in greater detail by the Rev. Joseph J. Ostheimer, C. S. R., in an address devoted to the subject. The enterprise is viewed as one of those means suggested by Pius XI. in his encyclical on Christic Woodlock, designed to ease the worries of conscientious married couples who for economic reasons are unable to establish in their district a full time, at the prospect of expenses arising from compliance with the laws of God and nature.

The suggestions offered by the President of the Union and by Father Ostheimer were emphasized by a resolution on "Maternity Guilds," which in part reads: "We request our members in particular to use all means at their disposal to combat an

The church itself was destroyed by fire in 1912 while the Rev. Charles A. Crowley was pastor of the parish. It was almost immediately rebuilt. The present pastor is the Rev. John H. Walsh, rector of Saint Joseph's Church, Middletown, Pa., who is head of the parish in which Old Bohemia is included. It is the oldest Catholic Church on the Delaware Peninsula and one of the oldest in the country.

Part of Indian Trail For hundreds of years before the coming of the first settlers, it was part of an old Indian trail called the Choptank. Each summer, the local Indians camped along the banks of the Brandywine, where they raised their crops of corn, hunted deer, bear, and other wild animals.

Washington Used Road George Washington traveled over this road many times, passing through the church on his way to New Castle.
