The annual meeting of the Knights of Columbus Hospital Association of the State of New York was held at the Sanatorium Gabrieli on Sunday, Sept. 18, 1932.

At present 24 members are being cared for in the two Knights of Columbus units at the Sanatorium, the capacity is 44.

The per capita for 1932 for the Hospital Association had been fixed at 25 cents per member which is the lowest since the inception of this work.
