Praying for Dead Brings Ample Consolation, Bishop Says at Cemetery

(Continued from Page One) Bishop O'Hern addressed those present, saying: "The ceremony of the blessing of the graves observed each year on the fourth Sunday of September at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery is a venerable and cherished custom coming down through the centuries from the 'old world' and evokes a genuine spirit of love and devotion towards departed relatives and friends who lie buried in this consecrated spot. For in the words of the poet: 'There is a tear for all that die. A mourner at the humblest grave. This truth is doubly emphasized by all who possess the Christian faith and who believe in the resurrection of the dead. So much so, is this truth that few could imagine if perchance they could be in the City of Paris on the day on which the ceremony takes place, that it deserves of our attention it bears. For thousands of men, women and children may be seen on the street cars, the busses, and elegant and elegant carriages, and automobiles making their way to here in classes and various other cemeteries, their hands laden with flowers and immortelles to take part in the ceremony identical with that in which we are participating today. 'The word 'cemetery' comes from a Latin word 'Coemeterium' which means 'Sleeping Place,' and in the early days it was applied to any single tomb or to a grave yard, particularly to those containing burials in places outside the walls of Rome now commonly known as Catacombs. And so we are gathered here after another year has come and gone in this sacred spot which is called in the old Saxon phrase 'God's Acre,' the old Catholic name for a burial place, to offer up our prayers for the souls of our loved and dear ones in keeping with that solemn doctrine of Holy Mother Church known as the Communion of Saints. 'We are assembled here with mingled feelings of sadness and joy. We stand in the midst of relatives and friends whose mortal remains lie buried about us. We think of the loved ones who have passed from this earth, and our human nature is saddened, but the knowledge that our prayers are ascending to Heaven for the repose of their souls brings with it ample consolation to every Catholic heart. Acres and acres will roll on and yet, until the Angel of the resurrection shall call them forth to stand among that mighty multitude of every race, tribe and tongue on that last great day. 'Give Cemeteries' History 'Today there are 78,000 bodies resting within this consecrated ground which have now been in existence for 61 years, since Sept. 10, 1871,' he said. 'Eight days after the ceremony of consecration, on Sept. 13, the first burial at Holy Sepulchre was the infant child of an esteemed citizen of Rochester, the late Walter E. Duffy. From the founding of the City of Rochester until 1833, the Catholic dead were buried side by side with their non-Catholic friends, first in the Spring Street plot donated to the city by Messrs. Rochester, Fitzhugh and Carroll, commonly called the founders of Rochester. Later on in Buffalo Street, now Main Street West, on the site where the City Hospital stands. Finally, with the opening of Mount Hope in 1836, the civic cemetery was used by the Catholic population for burials. In 1838 the trustees of St. Patrick's Church, now known as the Cathedral, bought a 12-acre tract for \$1,200 on the Pinnacle Hill which was later increased to 27, and which is the oldest Catholic cemetery in the city. Between this and 1868 when Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid came to Rochester as the first bishop of the diocese, various small cemeteries were opened for different nationalities and were connected with their respective parishes. These were St. Joseph's, St. Boniface, SS. Peter and Paul's and Holy Family. Holy Sepulchre Established 'Being this situation, the first bishop of Rochester set out to estab-

Last Rites Held For Sister Joseph At Motherhouse

Funeral services for Sister M. Joseph Quinn of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Rochester, who died Wednesday in St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, after a brief illness were held Saturday morning at 9 o'clock at the Nazareth Convent Chapel, Pittsford. Burial took place in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

The solemn high requiem Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Thomas F. Connors, pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church, assisted by the Rev. James Kehoe, as deacon, and the Rev. William Ayres, as subdeacon, both assistant pastors at Blessed Sacrament Church. The Rev. John Healey of St. Francis de Sales Church, Geneva, was Master of Ceremonies assisted by the Rev. Howard Geck, motherhouse Chaplain.

In the sanctuary were the Most Rev. Thomas F. Healy, D.D., Archbishop of Vincennes, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Joseph S. Cameron, the Rev. George Fredmore, the Rev. Louis Edelman, the Rev. John M. Duffy and the Rev. Joseph McDonnell. The last blessing was given by Father Connors. The Rev. John Hogan officiated at the grave.

As a teacher of vocal and instrumental music, Sister Joseph was well known throughout the Diocese of Rochester where she labored faithfully for more than fifty years. Her early work was done in Ithaca and Auburn and in the Fall of 1900 she was recalled to Rochester to supervise the department of Music at Nazareth Academy for the past twelve years. Sister Joseph was in charge of the music at Blessed Sacrament School. Here among other duties she assumed the organization and direction of a boys' choir which now ranks among the finest of its kind in the Diocese.

Throughout her long years of able service Sister Joseph ever stood out as an inspiring teacher of youth and her death will be deeply felt among the directors of school and church music. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. B. Curtin and Mrs. M. McMillen and several nieces and nephews.
