Father Affleck Recently Named To Hdq's Staff

The Rev. John B. Affleck, O.P., who is conducting a retreat for the men of the Holy Name Society this week at Holy Rosary Church, Lexington Avenue, has recently been appointed by the Very Rev. T. S. McDermott, O.P., S.T.L., to the staff of the Holy Name Society headquarters in New York City. Father Affleck is a native of Providence, R. I. He made his preparatory studies at La Salle Academy, Providence, St. Anselm's College, Manchester, N. H., and Providence College, Providence. He entered the Dominican Novitiate at Somerset, Ohio, in August, 1922, made his philosophical studies at St. Rose Spring, Kentucky, and the Dominican House of Studies at River Forest, Ill. He pursued his theological course at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, D. C., and was ordained in June, 1929. For two and a half years after his ordination, Father Affleck served as Chaplain of the Federal Penitentiary in the District of Columbia where he established a reputation for himself in dealing with men, non-Catholics as well as Catholics. Father Affleck is also an enthusiastic Holy Name worker. His initial task will bring him in contact with Spiritual Directors in New York Archdiocese and Newark Diocese, where in addition to promoting the Holy Name Cause he will endeavor to introduce The Holy Name Journal into those parishes where it has no representation.

Rochester Priest Promoted to Major In the U. S. Army

Promotion from the rank of captain to that of major for the Rev. Walter J. Donoghue, United States Army Chaplain, who belongs to Rochester Diocese, has been announced recently in War Department Orders received at headquarters of the 2nd Corps Area on Governor's island. Major Donoghue first entered the military service in September 1918 with the rank of first lieutenant. He became a captain in September 1923. His present station is the Sternberg General Hospital, Manila, P. I. At the consecration of Bishop O'Hearn three years ago, Father Donoghue took part in the ceremonies attired in his chaplain's uniform of the United States Army.
