Father Khmann Speaks
Declaring that an individual must root his life in fundamentals of the life is futile and likewise a nation must remember its history or its fate is doomed, Father Khmann gave a scholarly exposition of the life of Columbus pointing out that in the historical records of his life, the greatest of God could be found.
Father Khmann said that the ambition of Columbus was to Christianize the land he found rather than to gather for himself material gains. He said that the America Columbus founded is today disunited in its religious beliefs and if it can be hoped to fuse the various elements into one it can be done only with the help of an organization, the Church of Jesus Christ.
Man cannot be forced into unity from without. It must come through his own mind. The Church today is facing problems, not found in the days of Columbus and the Holy Father is calling for the loyalty of every layman and laywoman. Conditions in Mexico, Father Khmann stated, could not have come to pass if there were the combined force of an organized, informed laity. He urged recognition of leaders in Church and State, who can be followed and to whom full loyalty can be given.
Pays Tribute to Chaplain
Mr. Kennedy, who followed, paid tribute to the late Rev. Lewis O'Hern, C.S.P., brother of Bishop O'Hern, for work done as the first Knights of Columbus chaplain in France. He said that had it not been for the courage, firmness and diplomacy of Father O'Hern, the K. of C. would have made no repute in the war work.
"Here in this magnificent building, you Knights of Columbus have concrete fruition of what the founder of this order, the humble parish priest of Waterbury, wanted it to be, an active, vital force in the world," said Mr. Kennedy. "We are meant to do things through the Knights of

with a total Catholic population of twenty and a half millions. These figures give some idea of the tremendous growth of the Catholic population of the United States through immigration and through the birth of native-born children. This could not be more clearly demonstrated than in the case of the new school, which has been erected in the heart of the parish.
Record of Parish
In this parish this morning, then, were assembled only one small unit of that great army of baptized Catholics who make up the universal Church of over 300,000,000 souls. And yet, this parish is just as important as the larger parishes in the great cities because it has carried on and is carrying on the work of religion and education for the honor and glory of God and for the salvation of souls. Of education we shall have occasion to speak this afternoon in connection with the dedication of the new school building standing opposite this church property.
But of religion what a record of accomplishment has not been entered by the Guardian Angel in the book of eternal life during the past fifty years of the parochial life of St. Joseph's! During these years eleven pastors have served the congregation, two of whom, Rev. Joseph H. O'Connell, S.T.D., M.R., is the celebrant of the Solemn High Mass and Rev. Arthur Florack who we welcome back here as two of the most earnest, devout and hard working priests in the diocese. During these fifty years 935 Baptisms took place, 629 Marriages are recorded and 323 Deaths are found in the official register of the books telling us of the generations of Catholics who have lived here, who died and who now make up your city of the dead in St. Joseph Cemetery. No one but the Almighty knows the graces and blessings that have come through the preaching of the word of God, through the administering of His Sacraments particularly of Penance and Holy Eucharist, and above all through the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass which has been offered up daily on this altar of God for half a century. Again in the history of the parish one young man is actually studying for the priesthood and two young women have entered Religious Communities to serve God and His little ones.
